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1 MS. VEST: Can everybody hear me if 2 I don't use the mike? 3 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Sure. MS. VEST: 4 Okay. I have been sick 5 with this cold that's going around, but I think my throat can take it; so if, for 6 7 whatever reason, someone finds it difficult to hear, by all means, you know, just let us 8 know. 9 10 I want to thank everybody for 11 coming tonight. The time is approximately 12 6:03 p.m. on Tuesday, January 8. MS. POTTER: 13 Wednesday. 14 MS. VEST: -- Wednesday -- sorry --15 January 8, 2020. And we are here this 16 evening to provide a formal platform for 17 DNREC to receive public comment on Allen 18 Harim's permit application that's currently pending before the Department. 19 20 Allen Harim Foods has applied for a 21 permit to transport non-hazardous liquid waste to its Harbeson Wastewater Treatment 22 23 Plant. 24 It should be noted that this permit



1 at issue tonight only specifically regulates 2 the transportation of waste on Delaware's public roads, so it's a bit of a specified 3 4 matter. 5 For those that may not know me, my name is Lisa Vest, and Secretary Garvin has 6 7 appointed me to serve as the hearing officer 8 for this permit matter. 9 If some of you that came in late 10 have not already done so, I would ask that 11 you sign the formal sign-in sheets in the 12 back of the room. 13 There is a spot to indicate whether 14 you wish to submit comment. If so, please 15 make sure to go ahead and put your name and 16 contact information on that, because we like 17 to have a good record of who attends these 18 matters. Even if you don't wish to comment, 19 20 we would still like to have your name on 21 there. With regard to the comments that 22 23 are going to be offered tonight, there are some brief formal protocols that must be 24



1 adhered to. I'm going to go over them very 2 quickly. Consistent with all public hearings 3 4 held by DNREC, all comment must be limited solely to the subject matter of tonight's 5 hearing, which again is the transport permit 6 7 application pending with Allen Harim Foods. Pursuant to the subject matter of 8 9 this hearing, all comments pertinent to that 10 hearing application will be incorporated into 11 the hearing record being generated in this 12 matter. As is DNREC's policy at all formal 13 14 hearings such as this, each person wishing to 15 offer comment tonight is asked to do so in as 16 precise a manner as possible. 17 In order to treat everyone equally 18 and fairly, each person is granted a total of three minutes in which to offer their 19 20 comments. 21 To facilitate that protocol and to ensure fairness with regard to the time each 22 23 person is allotted to comment, there will be 24 a visual timer in place tonight to help



1 everyone be aware of their time remaining 2 while they comment. If you have already submitted 3 4 written comment to the Department prior to tonight's hearing, that information is 5 already in the hearing record. 6 7 Keeping in mind that everyone needs to be given the opportunity to speak tonight, 8 it is not necessary to offer the same comment 9 10 verbally if you have already provided it to 11 the Department in writing. 12 Additionally, if you have brought 13 prepared written comments or statements with 14 you, you can certainly present them to me 15 when you have been recognized as the next 16 commenter. I will then mark them and enter 17 18 them into the hearing record, and then you can use your three-minute time to offer a 19 brief summary of the comments verbally for 20 21 the benefit of those in attendance tonight. The three-minute timer for each 22 23 person wishing to offer comment is to be 24 enforced at tonight's proceeding. And,



1 again, enforcement of this protocol ensures 2 all persons in attendance at all DNREC hearings across the state are treated equally 3 4 and professionally. 5 There is no yielding of time from one commenter to another. Again, each person 6 7 is entitled to three minutes total with no 8 exceptions. 9 Consistent with DNREC's policy at 10 all of its hearings and pursuant to current 11 Delaware law, all persons wishing to offer 12 comment at public hearings must be physically 13 present in order to be recognized. 14 That being said, any commenter who 15 is physically present here will be permitted to read into the record the comments of 16 17 someone who may be absent, provided that the 18 commenter who is present fully identifies the 19 absent person by name at the time such comment is offered. 20 21 A gentle reminder that there is 22 only one record of this formal proceeding 23 tonight, and it is the official court 24 reporter's verbatim transcript that's being



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prepared this evening.

To that extent, the court reporter 2 3 can only hear and accurately transcribe one 4 voice at a time. 5 In order to ensure accuracy of the transcript and to be mindful of the protocols 6 7 that we are talking about, I would ask that 8 no one speak while another person is 9 speaking, and do not call out from the 10 audience for any reason. 11 If there are members of the news 12 media here tonight, they are not prohibited from audio or visual recording from this 13 14 proceeding. 15 I do ask, however, that you use any 16 equipment that you may have in a way that is unobtrusive and would not interfere with the 17 18 ability of others to see and hear during the 19 hearing. Whether listening or speaking, we 20 21 ask that everyone here be respectful and considerate of all comment offered here 22

tonight, even if some comment may differ inopinion from your own.

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1 Additionally, at this point I would 2 ask that all cell phones be either muted or turned off for the duration of the 3 4 proceedings so as to avoid any disruption. 5 The statutory purpose of tonight's hearing is to allow citizens to offer comment 6 7 on this pending permit application from Allen Harim. 8 A record consisting of the 9 10 transcript of verbal comments offered 11 tonight, all written comments received by the 12 Department, all exhibits presented, and ultimately the Hearing Officer's Report, will 13 14 all be reviewed by the Secretary during his 15 review of the hearing record. 16 The Secretary will then ultimately 17 issue an order, following his review, containing his decision on this application 18 and the reasons therefore. 19 Myself and other DNREC staff 20 21 members are present to facilitate public comment but not to participate in these 22 23 proceedings. As such, there is no Q and A 24 session permitted during the course of



tonight's hearing.

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Lastly, it's important to note that no decision has already been made by the Department, nor will any decision be made tonight with regard to this pending permit application. Again, the purpose of tonight's hearing is to provide this formal platform

9 for the public to come and offer their 10 comment specifically related to this pending 11 permit application and for such comment to be 12 incorporated into the hearing record for the 13 Secretary's consideration.

The ultimate decision with regard
to this matter is made by DNREC's Secretary
Garvin.

This formal proceeding tonight merely acts as a mechanism to enable the Department to vet a pending permit application out there to the public and, once again, to provide the platform for the public to provide comment.

23That being said, I am now going to24turn the floor over to Department staff for



1 their brief presentation regarding this 2 matter. 3 MS. POTTER: Thank you, Lisa. Good 4 evening, everyone. My name is Kathy Potter. 5 I'm an Environmental Engineer in the Large Systems Branch of the Groundwater Discharges 6 7 Section in the Division of Water, part of DNREC, Department of Natural Resources and 8 Environmental Control. 9 10 Tonight we are here to discuss 11 Allen Harim Foods' non-hazardous liquid waste 12 transporter permit application to transport a 13 non-hazardous liquid waste, which is poultry 14 wash water. 15 My regulatory authority does not 16 include facility activities and are not part 17 of this permitting process. 18 Tonight's hearing is solely based on the transportation of non-hazardous liquid 19 20 waste. 21 At this time I would like to provide exhibits for the record: 22 23 State of Delaware regulations 24 governing the design, installation, and



1 operation of on-site wastewater treatment and 2 disposal systems. 3 Permit application from Allen Harim 4 Foods LLC, submitted on October 4, 2019. Public notice of the permit 5 application published on December 15, 2019. 6 7 And a printed copy of tonight's Power Point presentation. 8 Again, the purpose of the hearing 9 10 is to provide you the opportunity -- provide 11 you with the opportunity to present comment 12 regarding the transportation permit application. 13 14 The authority to issue the permit 15 rests in our Delaware Code, specifically 7 Delaware Code, Section 7101. That is what 16 17 gives my section the regulatory authority to 18 issue a permit to transport non-hazardous waste on state roads. 19 Regulatory requirements: 20 This 21 permit has regulatory authority over vehicle transport activities. It does not have 22 23 regulatory authority over facility 24 activities.



1 And there are two sections from the 2 regulations, which are the actual regulations 3 regarding the transportation, explaining 4 again why the permit is required. The application: Allen Harim's has 5 submitted a complete application to transport 6 7 other non-hazardous liquid waste, which is hatchery wash-down water, to be disposed of 8 at the Allen Harim Harbeson Wastewater 9 10 Treatment Plant. 11 The permit application has met the 12 regulatory requirements and is considered 13 complete. 14 The company did submit an 15 operational plan. Here are a lot of the 16 details regarding what they provided as part 17 of the application. 18 Spill and cleanup procedures are required for every permit application. 19 Vehicle cleanup is also required as part of 20 21 the application. And then recordkeeping procedures. 22 23 Those, again, were provided by the 24 They are not mandated by the company.



Department.

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Some general permit conditions 2 3 which would be in any permit that's issued 4 for this activity: All non-hazardous liquid waste 5 shall be transported only to authorized 6 7 facilities. None of the wastes shall be 8 deposited into ditches, water courses, lakes, 9 10 ponds, tidewater sources, landed property, or 11 at any point other than the authorized 12 facilities mentioned in the permit. All waste material collected shall 13 14 be transported and disposed in accordance 15 with the regulations, and they can't be 16 disposed of in any other way without specific 17 permission from the Department. 18 Every vehicle has to be leakproof, the truck, to transport this type of waste. 19 And all the hoses and the fittings 20 21 must be kept in good working order. Vehicles do have to comply with 22 23 state transportation requirements. Some of those are DelDOT; some of those are federal 24



1 trucking requirements. And they have to maintain a current 2 3 copy of their plan for their spills on file 4 with the Department, which is why it's part of the application. 5 Transporters at all times have to 6 7 have commercial automobile liability insurance of at least \$100,000. And any 8 spill greater than 25 gallons has to be 9 10 reported to the Department. 11 Thank you for your interest and 12 participation. There is my contact information. 13 14 There is also a hearing website. Ι 15 don't expect you to write down that entire 16 web page, but it is available on the 17 Department's website. 18 And there is my contact phone and 19 e-mail. 20 So if you have any questions 21 pertaining to the public hearing, they have to go to Lisa, not me. 22 23 MS. VEST: All right. Thank you, 24 Ms. Potter.



1 Let the record reflect that the 2 Department's exhibits that were offered just 3 now, Exhibits 1 through 4, are hereby entered 4 into the formal record. 5 Also, as a matter of recordkeeping, I received written e-mail comments from 6 7 Shelly Cohen at 3:44 this afternoon. T'm 8 going to go ahead and enter them into the record at this time, as well. 9 They are 10 marked as Cohen Exhibit Number 1. And thank 11 you, Ms. Cohen, for that. And all of these exhibits, along 12 13 with the transcript when we get it, will be 14 put up on the hearing website. 15 So, if there is any confusion on 16 where to go on our website to look for that, 17 by all means ask me at the conclusion of the 18 proceedings, and I can give you a business card and tell you where to go to get that and 19 shoot you a link if need be. 20 21 That being said, I want to now turn the floor over to those who wish to offer 22 23 comment for the record in no particular order 24 other than the order that you guys signed up



1 in. I will go ahead and start. Anthony 2 Scarpa? 3 MR. SCARPA: Yes. I asked this 4 question at the last Allen Harim hearing. Has Allen Harim paid the fines imposed -- has 5 Allen Harim paid the fines imposed by the 6 7 Secretary of DNREC for their 2016 wastewater violations? 8 I could not find any proof of the 9 10 fines being paid on your website. 11 There is also an offset that's 12 supposed to take place between Allen Harim 13 and a conservatory group here in the State of 14 Delaware. That has not taken place yet. 15 This hearing should not be held, 16 nor should any other Allen Harim hearings be 17 held until those fines are paid. 18 I'm not sure why you would even entertain hearing the Allen Harim 19 applications until these fines are paid. 20 21 These fines date back to 2016 from over 90 wastewater violations. 22 We have been told that DNREC has 23 24 limited budget resources and personnel. How



1 do you ever expect to expect all of these 2 trucks and all this equipment that you are telling us that Allen Harim is supposed to be 3 4 keeping in good working order? Another question I have is how do 5 you find the time and the resources to 6 7 prepare detailed Power Point presentations for multibillion dollar corporations like 8 Allen Harim? 9 10 Out of the last four presentations 11 I have seen have been a lot more extensive 12 than this one tonight. But I just don't 13 understand how a state agency that claims to 14 have limited budget resources and limited 15 personnel can take their time and their staff 16 and turn over preparing Power Point 17 presentations for corporations like Allen 18 Harim, Artesian, Clean Delaware, and Blessings. 19 So I'm not quite sure I understand 20 21 how this all happens. The people of Millsboro and Milton 22 23 have very little faith in DNREC's ability or 24 desire to enforce your own permit conditions



1 and regulations. We have asked the Delaware Attorney 2 3 General's Office to take away enforcement 4 from DNREC and them to be responsible to 5 enforce permit violations and fines. It remains to be seen whether the 6 7 political contributions being made by the poultry industry and the utility companies 8 9 will overshadow the effort. Thank you. 10 MS. VEST: Thank you, Mr. Scarpa. 11 Susan Scarpa? 12 MRS. SCARPA: Yes. I'm just 13 appalled at what goes on here in Delaware. 14 We are not protected by any of the 15 contamination that has occurred since we have 16 been living here. We have been here three 17 years. 18 I cannot believe what is going on. 19 And it seems to me DNREC is not protecting They are all connected with the 20 the people. 21 chicken waste plants. I feel like they are getting paid off, and I'm sure they are. 22 23 It's just -- it's criminal, and 24 it's sinful, and none of this should be



happening.

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2 Because whatever goes down there, 3 eventually they are going to want to bring it 4 down here to Milton. And we have already had 5 enough contamination. And that's all I have to say. 6 7 MS. VEST: Thank you, Ms. Scarpa. Andrea Green? 8 9 MS. GREEN: Yes. Good evening. My 10 name is Andrea Green. I live in Milton, 11 Delaware. 12 And I will submit a written copy of 13 my statements. I would like to go over some 14 of the major points. 15 One of the things I note is in the 16 presentation from Ms. Potter, there was an 17 indication that a general permit condition is 18 that the waste is to be transported only to authorized facilities. And she also 19 specifically referred to this as 20 21 non-hazardous liquid waste. The source of the non-hazardous 22 23 liquid waste that's at issue in this matter 24 is wash-down water from the Allen Harim



1 Dagsboro Hatchery. That effluent is 2 currently discharged to an on-site 150-gallon 3 lagoon. 4 Allen Harim was found by DNREC to have violated their permit regarding 5 wastewater from the Dagsboro hatchery in 2016 6 7 and '17 with huge overloading of limits of nitrogen and, in some instances, ammonia in 8 9 particular. 10 As a result of being found in 11 violation of their permit, Allen Harim 12 entered into a conciliation order with DNREC on October 30, 2018. And under the terms of 13 14 that order, they were fined -- or there was 15 an administrative penalty of \$300,000 plus 16 costs were to be paid. They also were to terminate spray 17 operation facilities -- spray operation at 18 19 that facility. 20 And they were to connect to the 21 Sussex County Wastewater Treatment Facility, which was to be done within 12 months from 22 23 receipt of approvals. 24 I have spoken this week with Hans

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1 Medlarz, who is the Sussex County Engineer, regarding the status of that connection. 2 He indicated there is a serious 3 4 issue of concern regarding the use of 5 quaternary ammonia at that facility. The extremely high levels of ammonia in the 6 7 wastewater would result in extreme risks to the viability of the entire system that the 8 9 county has ongoing. 10 Every wastewater facility, 11 treatment facility, depends on the presence 12 of microorganisms to permit the system to function as intended. 13 14 The problem with excess levels of 15 quaternary ammonia is that it is so effective as a disinfectant that there is a risk of 16 17 destroying what actually makes a wastewater 18 system function. Due to the level of ammonia in this 19 wastewater, I cannot see how this can be 20 21 considered to be a non-hazardous liquid waste if transported to Allen Harim and placed into 22 23 their treatment for the poultry processing 24 facility.



1 Additionally, based on the NPDES permit that was issued to Allen Harim at the 2 3 Harbeson facility, this would present a 4 substantial change that would require an 5 application for amendment to its permit. I am aware of no such amendment 6 7 that has been applied for. And for that reason, the waste should not be permitted to 8 9 be transported to the facility if it can't be 10 disposed of there. 11 I know that my three minutes are 12 And I will ask that at the end of the up. 13 comments that are given today, I would ask 14 for some additional time to go over some 15 additional items that I would like to present 16 in my statement. 17 When I checked on the list just 18 before sitting down, there were, I believe, five people who had indicated they wished to 19 20 make comments. I believe it may now be up to 21 either six or seven. And there is really no reason to limit comments to three minutes. 22 23 So I would ask for some additional 24 time at the end. And I will hand in a



1 written copy of my statement. 2 MS. VEST: Understood. Thanks, 3 Shelly Cohen? Ms. Cohen, I have Ms. Green. 4 your comments. They are in the record. Would you like --5 MS. COHEN: I still want to speak 6 7 after them. No, that's fine. I just 8 MS. VEST: 9 wanted to doublecheck. You can proceed. 10 MS. POTTER: She said she will 11 speak after the other people. 12 MS. VEST: Sorry. I didn't catch 13 that. Very good. Keith Steck. 14 MR. STECK: Thank you for the 15 opportunity to comment. Um, I will make it 16 brief, since we only have three minutes' time 17 to speak. 18 First of all, this application 19 appears to be a new application for hauling, but it's supposedly non-hazardous waste. 20 21 However, the information provided 22 is vague and limited and raises many 23 concerns. 24 First off, for example, the concern



1 that this is 6.2 million gallons of total 2 waste, but the size of the hauling truck is 6,000 gallons, which works out to over a 3 4 thousand trips each way, a round trip being 5 2,000 trips. Where is the information about the 6 7 What are the routes? traffic? How many schools are this passing by? Especially if 8 9 they use Iron Branch Road, which should be 10 considered one of the many routes that they 11 will likely use. 12 The other point that I want to 13 raise about this is that again the 14 information about what this is being hauled 15 is unclear. 16 Ostensibly, it says that it is the wash-down water. Yet, further discussion and 17 18 examination of the information points out that they are hauling wastewater from 19 Harbeson from the spray field because they 20 21 had to stop spraying this stuff, and that 22 that's being hauled. 23 So are those two being mixed 24 together? And are they being mixed with



1 other waters that are put into the holding? 2 The other part of this is, in examining and reviewing the letters submitted 3 4 from October 4th from Harbeson, it points out that they stated that -- the letter, as far 5 as I'm concerned, is alarming, because Harim 6 7 falsely states the wash-down water and 8 hatchery brine water were allowed to be 9 applied by spray irrigation, and that letter 10 was signed by the environmental engineer. 11 Nowhere in the cited pages of the 12 permit does it say the term "wash-down 13 water." That is not included specifically. 14 The brine water, it says that that 15 was applied and allowed. It specifically 16 says, "The facility-specific conditions, 17 brine water from the reserve osmosis water 18 treatment system may not be discharged to the spray irrigation fields." 19 So how could that possibly have 20 21 been put on there? Is that what triggered the October 8, 2018 DNREC consent order? 22 23 There are other issues that raise 24 serious concerns about the validity of what



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they are proposing.

1 I don't know how DNREC employees 2 3 could make a decision when they don't have 4 detailed information. The cited cleaning fluid or 5 cleaning compound that they were supposed to 6 7 use, there is no description, despite Harim saying that this is something that they have 8 approved; yet, they don't provide anything 9 10 that details what's in that. 11 If you have cleaning solution, that stuff could be chlorinated. It may be some 12 13 other caustic compound. But what's the definition? 14 15 If that's the case, this is not 16 non-hazardous waste. 17 MS. POTTER: Would you like to 18 submit this? 19 MR. STECK: Yes, I do. Is that 20 MS. VEST: Thank you. 21 comments? 22 MS. POTTER: Yes. 23 MS. VEST: Okay. Thank you, 24 Mr. Steck. Maria Payan?



1 MS. PAYAN: Hi. I'm Maria Payan, 2 104 West Mill Pond Drive, Selbyville, 3 Delaware, 19975. 4 I have a lot of concerns about, as you all do, the content of this hatchery wash 5 water, or is it hatchery waste, as well? 6 7 DNREC should require mandatory manifest sheets, and they should be available 8 to the public as part of this permit. 9 10 I had put in a FOIA before to DNREC 11 about how this waste is actually being 12 tracked. 13 And from the responses that I got 14 from the agency, it appears that there is no 15 tracking except by the industry itself. 16 There is no software. Nothing is being used 17 by the regulatory agency to see what's 18 flowing. So, for that reason, I think that 19 20 the manifest sheets have to be part of this 21 permit, and they have to be available to the 22 public. 23 Within the hatchery waste, there 24 are pathogens, viruses, um, that are harmful

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1 to wildlife as well as public health. 2 So I want to remind everybody, 3 vaccines are put into the eggs. 4 The wastewater system at the Harbeson treatment plant, it was not designed 5 to take in hatchery waste. 6 7 They are also taking in waste from Allen Harim's further processing. 8 We would like to be made aware of 9 10 actually all the waste that Harbeson is 11 taking in, how much waste it is, and if the 12 system is actually able to handle it. I can't read, obviously, this whole 13 14 nine-page thing in three minutes. It's 15 called the Ammonia Disinfection of Hatchery Waste for Elimination, a single strand of RNA 16 17 viruses. 18 But I just want to read you some of what is in hatchery waste: H7N1 19 low-pathogenic Avian Influenza Virus, H5N3, 20 21 bovine parainfluenza, infectious bronchitis virus, Avian Hepatitis E. 22 I can't even 23 pronounce that one. 24 This is scary. This is scary. And

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1 I recommend that you deny this. 2 This should not be going through 3 this plant and ultimately ending up in spray 4 fields going near neighbors all on well 5 water. It's not safe. Public health 6 7 Our water matters. Please, please matters. 8 deny this. 9 MS. VEST: Thank you, Ms. Payan. 10 (Ms. Payan hands document) Thank you, 11 Ms. Payan, for that. 12 Insofar as housekeeping, I want to go back and make sure the record reflects 13 14 that Andrea Green's written comments and 15 statements, as provided to me, are 16 incorporated into the hearing record and marked as such as Green Exhibit 1. And I 17 18 thank her again for that. Likewise, Mr. Steck's comments are 19 hereby incorporated into the record and 20 21 marked as Steck Exhibit 1. And lastly, Ms. Payan's written 22 23 comments provided to us just now, which were 24 very detailed, as she said, nine pages, are



1 hereby entered into the record and marked as Payan Exhibit Number 1, as well. And I thank 2 3 you guys for that. 4 All of these, I think this is 5 pretty well known at this point --Oh, Shelly, I am so sorry. 6 7 MS. COHEN: Is this on? 8 MS. VEST: Please proceed. So I did submit 9 MS. COHEN: 10 comments. And some of what I have to say 11 overlaps with what Andrea and people were 12 saying. 13 But I do want to add that, you know -- I wanted to add that in the theme of 14 15 what is in the waste. Okav? 16 Like, that really isn't specified, and there can be a lot of things in there. 17 When I was reading up on this, I 18 found out that these hatcheries, they have 19 some stuff in the process that, aside from 20 21 the chemicals and the pharmaceuticals that they use, and cleanup things, which could be 22 23 represented as Formaldehyde. 24 Well, not all chicks makes it



1 through the system. Apparently, they have a way of determining male chicks from the 2 The male chicks aren't good 3 female chicks. 4 producers. They don't gain weight fast 5 enough, so they dispose of them. So that's in the waste. 6 7 And, you know, it's just -- it's a toxic mess of stuff that ends up being a main 8 9 concern from people from the Milton area is 10 that all this stuff is going to wind up on 11 that on 1,800 acres of spray fields and in 12 that 90 million-gallon lagoon that's out there in unincorporated Milton. 13 14 Not only that. I have a few 15 You are saying the permit is comments. 16 strictly about transporting over Delaware 17 roads. 18 Well, who owns this operation? Everything about -- every time we have an 19 Allen Harim hearing, it's Allen Harim this 20 21 and Allen Harim that. 22 Well, this is Allen's Hatchery, 23 right, Allen's Hatchery. When you look up 24 the entity in the Delaware State corporate

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1 entity lookup thing, it's the owner is, I 2 think, a gentleman who has passed away a long 3 time ago. 4 I think it's the same one that filed for bankruptcy for Harim, I think, when 5 it was Allen Foods, simply Allen Foods. 6 7 And Allen Harim, yeah, they own a lot of businesses. And everybody, DNREC and 8 9 other, you know, other agencies in Sussex 10 County Council, they always talk about it 11 like it's one big company. 12 It's many companies, and each one is a different legal entity. And they should 13 14 present their documents, their applications, 15 for that entity. And this is a theme that I 16 have brought up before. 17 So your assurance information about 18 the transport and who is insuring, well, that's under Allen Harim Foods, and this is 19 20 Allen's Hatchery. Right? Different 21 entities. And when you have, you know, you 22 23 are saying \$100,000 is adequate insurance for 24 transporting on these roads? You could wipe



1 out a family in a car. You could wipe out 2 several cars, several families of cars. 3 You could wipe out a schoolyard. 4 This is going to go past the middle school 5 and the elementary school. The playgrounds are right there on that road. 6 7 It's, you know, you don't think about the content of the waste. 8 Simply they 9 are telling you non-hazardous waste, and you 10 go sure, yeah, non-hazardous waste. 11 Did you look at the operation? Did 12 you look at the lab reports? Did you ask any 13 questions? 14 And basically, to sum up, due 15 diligence has not been done. You are the 16 regulatory agency, and you shouldn't just be 17 like, oh, yeah, it's a truck on the roads. 18 It's not just a truck on the roads. It's a truck full of unknown waste, possibly 19 hazardous, probably hazardous, that that 20 21 truck could break loose, and you could have a catastrophic incident that affects thousands 22 23 of people. And it's amazing to me when you 24 just boil it down to the permit to transport



over the road.

-	over the road.
2	And then we all have eyes and ears,
3	and we have all seen these trucks. And let
4	me tell you, they don't look like they are
5	well maintained. They look like they are
6	from 1940 and have been stuck together with
7	some glue.
8	So, anyway, I will just leave it at
9	that.
10	MS. VEST: Thank you, Ms. Cohen.
11	And thank you for reminding me I needed to go
12	back to you. Apologies on that.
13	I want to make sure everybody
14	knows, every time that we go to a hearing,
15	every comment that is incorporated into the
16	record, every exhibit that gets identified
17	and marked as being incorporated into the
18	record, they all go on the DNREC hearing web
19	page for that particular matter.
20	When the transcript comes in in
21	seven to ten days, that will get posted on
22	that web page.
23	So all of these things are out
24	there. And I do know, because I see the data



1 behind all of these websites, people are 2 hitting these websites; they are watching it. 3 So what you submit does matter. 4 And I appreciate it, and that's what makes these hearing so important to the overall 5 process for Secretary Garvin. 6 7 That being said, I am also charged 8 with consistency with regard to this matter, and so, even though it is a small crowd 9 10 tonight, I have to adhere to the standard 11 three minutes. And I appreciate the desire to talk 12 13 more, but once that toothpaste is out of the 14 tube, everybody is going to want more than 15 three minutes; so I have to respectfully deny 16 that request. 17 But, again, everything -- because 18 this is a lot of detailed information that you guys have provided. You are absolutely 19 20 right, it cannot be rattled through in three 21 minutes. But it does get its due on the website. 22 23 People do hit this. People do 24 watch it. And it is reviewed by the



1 Secretary in its entirety prior to him making a decision. 2 And all of these concerns are also 3 4 forwarded to the division in charge of this, and they are charged with answering it and 5 providing me a response document that 6 7 eventually will also get posted on that web 8 page once it comes in. So, again, I do thank you for that. 9 10 That being said, I have gone 11 through the list of people that wish to 12 speak. And, again, I do thank you for your 13 14 time and in putting those comments out there. 15 Secretary Garvin does review them all; believe me. 16 17 It will be up on the website, 18 hopefully, by noon tomorrow. I want to thank 19 everybody for attending tonight. This 20 hearing is adjourned. 21 (Concluded at 6:37 a.m.) 22 23 24
