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MS. VEST: Okay. The time is 6:00 p.m. I want to thank everybody for tuning in tonight. We are going to go ahead and start the proceeding.

Thank you for taking the time out of your busy schedules to connect with DNREC. The date is Wednesday, March 25, 2020, and we are here this evening to provide this virtual platform for DNREC to conduct a public hearing on proposed revisions to the multiple SIPs, or State Implementation Plan.

For those of you who may not know me, my name is Lisa Vest, and Secretary

Garvin has appointed me to serve as the hearing officer for tonight.

There have been some changes to DNREC'S standard protocols, necessitated by Delaware's ongoing State of Emergency.

First and foremost, this hearing is being conducted virtually. No one is gathered physically together for this matter to occur. Everyone is participating independently at their own respective locations.

While there are no sign-in sheets
to document physical attendance tonight, this
virtual platform, WebEx, does generate a list
of those that are virtually present for this
proceeding, so the Department will still have
a record of those who have who electronically
joined us. And, again, I thank you for that.

At the conclusion of these
introductory remarks, I will be turning the

introductory remarks, I will be turning the hearing over to Mark Prettyman, who will be making a formal presentation regarding the proposed actions of the Department.

This will be presented as part of the hearing record that's being generated tonight.

There is still a court reporter virtually present creating a verbatim transcript of this proceeding, pursuant to the statutory requirement for DNREC to have the same prepared.

As always, that transcript will be posted on the hearing web page dedicated to this matter as soon as it is received.

It should be noted that the

Department will not be accepting any comments in realtime during the virtual proceeding this evening. However, DNREC wishes to ensure that everyone is able to offer their comments for inclusion into the hearing record.

Therefore, in all such virtual hearings of DNREC until further notice, the record will remain open for a minimum of 15 days following the hearing event.

In more complex cases, and in the event a request for a longer comment period has been received, an extension of time for the public comment may be granted.

I would encourage those who have logged in or called in this evening to check out DNREC's web page for public hearings under the Administrative Law Section of the website for more detail on how this will be moving forward with virtual.

Of course, all mechanisms

previously available by which to offer

comment remain intact, whether it's members

of the public offering their comment by the

electronic link that's provided on the web 1 2 page, or they could e-mail it, and, of course, the United States Postal Service. 3 4 In addition to the above, all of 5 the following protocols still remain in place for all DNREC public hearings. 6 7 Number one, all comment must be related solely to the subject matter of 8 9 tonight's public hearing, which, again, is 10 the proposed revisions to the Department's 11 SIPs. 12 In order to ensure that everyone who wishes to offer comment for the 13 14 Secretary's consideration is accommodated, 15 the record in this matter shall remain open 16 for a full 15 days following tonight's

the record in this matter shall remain open for a full 15 days following tonight's proceedings, or through the close of business, which is 4:30 p.m. on Thursday, April 9, 2020.

It should be noted there is only

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one authentic record of this proceeding tonight, and it will be the court reporter's verbatim transcript.

The WebEx virtual platform that we



are utilizing tonight will also provide a recording of the event, which staff will also post on the hearing web page dedicated to this matter. Again, for clarification purposes, however, the court reporter's transcript is the official record of this matter.

Lastly, it is important to note that no decision has already been made by the Department, nor will any decision be made tonight with regard to the proposed revisions.

The purpose of tonight's hearing is to build the record with regard to the proposed actions of the Department. A record consisting of the transcript of this virtual hearing, all written comments that may be received, all exhibits, and my report will all be reviewed by Secretary Garvin.

The Secretary will ultimately issue an order following that review process. The order will contain the decision on this matter and the reasons therefore.

Again, there will be no question

and answer session permitted tonight, nor will any realtime comments be accepted during this virtual hearing.

Again, the record will remain open for 15 days following today's date so that members of the public do have an ample opportunity to offer written comments, should they wish to do so.

Written comment may be received on the hearing page, via e-mail to DNRECHearingComments@delaware.gov, or via the U.S. Postal Service at the address indicated on the hearing page and/or the public notice.

Written comments may not be submitted to the Department using social media platforms such as Twitter, Facebook, YouTube, or text messaging.

All comment received either through the United States Postal Service or through the electronic mechanisms described, they all bear the same weight as long as they are received by the Department on or before 4:30 p.m. on April 9th, and all will be considered equally by the Secretary prior to his making

1 a final decision. The ultimate decision regarding 2 3 this matter is made by Secretary Garvin. 4 This proceeding tonight acts as a mechanism to enable the Department to thoroughly vet 5 this proposed action to the public and to let 6 7 the public know the mechanisms available by which to provide comment for Secretary 8 Garvin's consideration. 9 10 That being said, I am going to turn 11 the platform over to Mark Prettyman, who is 12 with our Division of Air Quality, for his 13 presentation. 14 MR. PRETTYMAN: Thank you, Lisa. I 15 respectfully request that the slides be 16 enabled on the screen. 17 We are doing that now. MS. VEST: 18 MR. PRETTYMAN: Thank you. Good 19 evening, everyone. My name is Mark Prettyman, and I'm an Environmental Scientist 20 21 with the Airshed Planning and Inventory Group for the Division of Air Quality in the 22 23 Delaware Department of Natural Resources and 24 Environmental Control.



1	First, as stated by Lisa, there
2	have been some changes to the Department's
3	standard protocols, necessitated by
4	Delaware's ongoing State of Emergency due to
5	the COVID-19 pandemic.
6	On March 12, 2020, Delaware's
7	Governor John Carney issued a State of
8	Emergency Declaration to prepare for the
9	spread of COVID-19. The declaration became
10	effective at 8 a.m. on Friday, March 13,
11	2020.
12	The order stated that the Governor
13	specifically directed and authorized that all
14	public meetings of executive branch public
15	bodies may be conducted electronically,
16	either by means of telephone conference call
17	or video conference call.
18	The Department has addressed the
19	change in meeting format to the public
20	through several different means.
21	1. Press releases were issued by
22	the Department on March 17 and March 20.
23	2. An updated meeting notice was
24	published on the State of Delaware Public



1 Meeting Calendar on March 24. 2 And 3: An updated meeting notice 3 was posted on the website for DNREC public 4 hearings on March 24th. These efforts have been made to 5 ensure the public is aware of the change in 6 7 format of this hearing and can provide 8 comments on its content. 9 The purpose of this hearing is to 10 take public comments on three proposed State 11 Implementation Plan revisions to address the 12 2015 National Ambient Air Quality Standards 13 for ground-level ozone. 14 Specifically, these revisions are 15 to address the certification of Delaware 16 requirements for Reasonably Available Control 17 Technology; the certification of Delaware's 18 Nonattainment New Source Review program; and the certification of Delaware's Emission 19 20 Statement program. 21 The State Implementation Plan is a plan that identifies how a state will attain 22 23 and maintain air quality in order to conform



to each primary and secondary National

1	Ambient Air Quality Standard.
2	Delaware's initial State
3	Implementation Plan was approved by the
4	Environmental Protection Agency on May 31,
5	1972.
6	Since this initial approval, the
7	Delaware State Implementation Plan has been
8	revised numerous times to address air quality
9	nonattainment and maintenance issues.
10	These edits or additions to the
11	original State Implementation Plan, or
12	"revisions," as they are commonly referred
13	to, occur by updating plans and inventories,
14	and adding new and revised regulatory control
15	requirements.
16	Delaware's State Implementation
17	Plan is compiled in Title 40 of the Code of
18	Federal Regulations at Part 52, Subpart I.
19	The Federal Clean Air Act, as
20	amended by the Clean Air Act Amendments of
21	1990, requires all areas of the nation to
22	attain and maintain compliance with the
23	National Ambient Air Quality Standards.
24	These federal standards are



1 designed to protect the public health and welfare from six criteria pollutants, one of 2 which is ozone. 3 4 On October 1, 2015, the 5 Environmental Protection Agency promulgated a revised National Ambient Air Quality Standard 6 7 for ground-level ozone, from 0.075 parts per million to 0.070 parts per million. 8 Promulgation of a revised National 9 10 Ambient Air Quality Standard triggers a requirement for the Environmental Protection 11 12 Agency to designate areas as nonattainment, 13 attainment, or unclassifiable, and to 14 classify the nonattainment areas based upon 15 the severity of nonattainment at the time of 16 designation. 17 New Castle County, Delaware, was 18 designated as marginal nonattainment as part of the Philadelphia-Wilmington-Atlantic City 19 nonattainment area for the 2015 ozone 20 21 National Ambient Air Quality Standard, effective August 3, 2018. 22



designated as attainment areas for the 2015

Kent and Sussex Counties were

23

1 ozone National Ambient Air Quality Standard, 2 also effective August 3, 2018. 3 Depending on the classification of 4 nonattainment counties within a state, states 5 are required to submit State Implementation Plan revisions to demonstrate how they are 6 7 complying with the mandatory plan submission requirements for nonattainment areas under 8 the Clean Air Act. 9 10 With each new National Ambient Air 11 Quality Standard, the Environmental 12 Protection Agency summarizes the plan 13 requirements to implement the provisions of 14 the Clean Air Act which are applicable to 15 attainment and nonattainment areas, or 16 implementation plan requirements, as these 17 are more commonly known. 18 The Environmental Protection Agency finalized the Implementation Plan 19 Requirements for the 2015 ozone National 20 21 Ambient Air Quality Standard on December 6, 2018. 22 23 As a marginal nonattainment area,



New Castle County is subject to specific

requirements in this final rule.

However, as Delaware is a part of the Ozone Transport Region, which is a group of states identified under the Clean Air Act for the purposes of addressing interstate transport, all counties in Delaware are subject to certain implementation plan requirements.

Delaware is addressing three State Implementation Plan requirements in this hearing.

The first State Implementation Plan requirement which Delaware is addressing is Reasonably Available Control Technology.

Delaware is required to demonstrate that all major sources of nitrogen oxides and volatile organic compound emissions are required to implement controls which represent Reasonably Available Control Technology, as well as all sources and source categories covered by Control Technique Guidelines and Alternate Control Techniques issued by the Environmental Protection Agency.

Reasonably Available Control



1 Technology is required statewide since 2 Delaware is in the Ozone Transport Region. The first State Implementation Plan 3 4 revision being proposed this evening is a certification that Delaware's regulations 5 meet the requirements for Reasonably 6 7 Available Control Technology under the 2015 ozone National Ambient Air Quality Standard. 8 The second requirement which 9 10 Delaware is addressing is Nonattainment New 11 Source Review. Nonattainment New Source 12 Review is a preconstruction review permit 13 program that applies to new major stationary 14 sources or major modifications at existing 15 sources located in a nonattainment area. 16 This requirement is statewide, 17 since Delaware is in the Ozone Transport 18 Region. The second State Implementation 19 Plan revision being proposed this evening is 20 21 a certification that Delaware's Nonattainment New Source Review program meets the 22 23 requirements under the 2015 ozone National

Ambient Air Quality Standard.

1 The third requirement Delaware is addressing identifies plan submission 2 requirements to include rules which establish 3 4 annual reporting requirements for certain stationary sources. 5 This State Implementation Plan 6 7 revision is a certification that Delaware's regulations meet this "Emissions Statement" 8 requirement under the 2015 ozone National 9 10 Ambient Air Quality Standard. 11 The Department now enters the 12 following exhibits into the public record to 13 support the approval of the State Implementation Plan revisions as well as to 14 15 support the alteration of tonight's public 16 hearing to a virtual platform. VEST: Okay. Thank you very Let the record reflect that the 19 much, Mark. exhibits as identified by the Department just 20 21 now are hereby entered into the formal 22 hearing record. 23 Mark, is there anything further 24 that the Division of Air Quality wishes to



1	put on the record at this time?
2	MR. PRETTYMAN: Nothing further at
3	this time.
4	MS. VEST: Excellent. Thank you
5	very much.
6	At this point we would normally
7	open the floor to accept comment.
8	However, since it is virtual right
9	now, what we are going to do is ensure that
10	the record remains open for the public to
11	offer comment, if it wishes to do so, by the
12	various mechanisms that I spoke about in the
13	beginning of the hearing.
14	As is always the case, DNREC values
15	public input concerning all of its actions.
16	And so the record will remain open for an
17	additional 15 days following tonight's
18	proceeding.
19	The public may feel free to offer
20	comment for the Secretary's consideration.
21	They can do it by e-mail. They can do it by
22	electronic comment link, both of which are
23	available on the Department's website.
24	If you go to the DNREC website,



1 click on Administrative Law, go down, you 2 will see Public Hearings. You will find this one in a chronological listing of all public 3 4 hearings, and there will be buttons for easy 5 access. And you can enter the comments that 6 7 way, or you can simply write us to my attention, Lisa Vest, Hearing Officer, at the 8 DNREC offices here at 89 Kings Highway, 9 10 Dover, Delaware, 19901. 11 As I said before, all comment, 12 whether it be accepted electronically, via 13 e-mail, or by United States Postal Service, 14 all bears the same weight, and all will be 15 taken into consideration and weighed by the 16 Secretary prior to him making a decision. 17 At this point we are going to 18 conclude the virtual portion of our record. Thank you for taking the time to 19 join us electronically. And thank you again 20 21 for the Department's presentation. The record will remain open through 22 23 the close of business on April 9, 2020. 24 Thank you, guys. Everybody stay safe. This
