Re: DRPI expansion

Revolution Recovery operates a Construction and Demolition recycling plant in New Castle Delaware. We receive construction debris from dumpster companies. We sort out recyclable materials, like wood, plastic, drywall, cardboard, metal and more. 36 people are employed at the operation.

Revolution Recovery takes residual material from the recycling operation (that which cannot be recycled in current markets) to DRPI and other landfills. Recycling markets have been shrinking resulting in more material going to landfills. DRPI is the preferred landfill to ship to because of proximity. Shipping material to DRPI allows few trucks to make more trips in a day, dramatically reducing the number of trucks required and miles driven.

Our mission is to recycle construction materials, keep them out of landfills and develop new ways to reusing or beneficially using waste. We hope that in the future there are less landfills receiving less waste while, recycling, reuse, beneficial use, alternative energy and other new technologies flourish. It is our belief that to get there, increased recycling innovation, increased market development and decreased landfill capacity need to be raised in relative balance to not topple the process. Because of abysmal recycling and alternative fuel markets, we feel the continuation of DRPI as a private landfill for construction debris in its specific location is necessary.
