THE HEARING OFFICER: I'm going to go ahead and start the proceedings tonight. I want to welcome everybody for taking time out of their busy schedules to be here.

The date is Wednesday,

March 13th, 2019. We're here this evening
to provide a formal platform for the State
of Delaware Department of Natural Resources
and Environmental Control to receive public
comment on the matter at hand, which you can
see the photographs and which will be the
subject matter of the presentation tonight,
the Department's proposed plan of remedial
action for General Motors Corporation
Operable Unit 5.

For those of you who have not met me previously, my name is Lisa Vest, and Secretary Garvin has appointed me to serve as the hearing officer for tonight's proceeding. I believe everyone that was here tonight has already signed the sign-in sheet -- if not, they're right here, you can sign up afterward. We try to keep an

accurate record of those who have attended, so if you have not done so, again, they'll be available to sign up at the conclusion of this evening's meeting.

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I just have a couple preliminary things that I want to touch base on before I turn the floor over to Department staff. Consistent with all public hearings held by DNREC, the comment that is received for inclusion into the hearing record is limited to the subject matter of tonight's hearing, which, again, is the proposed plan of remedial action. As is DNREC's policy, at all formal hearings such as this, each person wishing to offer comment is asked to do so in precise of a manner as possible. We try to keep our hearings throughout the state consistent across the board. In order to do that, each person wishing to offer comment tonight will be granted a total of three minutes of time to offer verbal There will be a timer at the end comment. of the proceedings or at the end of the presentation, rather, that will give you

some visual clues as to how much time you have left as the three minutes are going forward.

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I should also say that if anyone brought any kind of documentations with them tonight, reports or studies or anything like that that you would wish to have included in the record, you may feel free to present that to me as well, and I will incorporate that into the hearing record.

I should also point out that the record will not close for comment at the conclusion of tonight's proceedings. going to allow the record to remain open for an additional 15 days following the conclusion of the hearing tonight. So anyone that maybe wished to be here but wasn't able to attend, they are more than welcome to offer written comment to the Department as long as it's received either by myself or by Mr. Galloway on or before close of business on Thursday, March 28th, 2019. It all bears the same weight. And it will all go before Secretary Garvin and be

considered by him prior to his making a decision.

I would also remind everybody
that there is a verbatim transcript being
done by the court reporter for tonight's
proceedings. So when you are recognized, if
you wish to offer comment, if you could say
your full name for the record so she's sure
to get you accurately, that would be
wonderful.

I would also ask that everybody turn off or mute their phone.

Lastly, there is no decision
that has been made prior to tonight's
hearing regarding this proposed plan nor
will one be made at the conclusion or end of
the comment period. All tonight is, is the
formal platform for the public to come and
offer comment. It's a gathering service, so
to speak, for the Secretary to get all the
comment and then he can consider it all
before he makes his decision.

That being said, I am going to turn it over to Department staff for their

1	presentation.
2	MR. GALLOWAY: Thank you, Lisa.
3	My name is Rick Galloway. I am
4	the DNREC SIRS Project Manager for the GM
5	Corporation's Operable Unit 5, which we also
6	call OU-5.
7	So on January 6, 2019, the DNREC
8	Site Investigation Restoration Section,
9	called SIRS, issued a Proposed Plan of
10	Remedial Action (Proposed Plan) for General
11	Motors Corporation under Hazardous Substance
12	Cleanup Act 7 Delaware Code Section 9107(e)
13	(1).
14	I've already turned in the
15	exhibits to Lisa. I'm going to read through
16	the list of exhibits. These are the
17	materials that were used in the
18	decision-making process for the Proposed
19	Plan of Remedial Action for Operable Unit 5.
20	Exhibit 1, July 17th, 2015,
21	Remedial Investigation Report. There are
22	Appendices A through H that are linked to

1	I'm sure you're all aware, but
2	this is the location of the General Motors
3	Corporation. During the presentation, you
4	can refer over to these posters here. There
5	are two posters. You can refer to that.
6	You can look at that. That's to help
7	people. When I'm referring to different
8	things, you can refer back to that.
9	You can see the building there
10	that is planned to be demolished. The area
11	we're talking about right here, this general
12	area. Boxwood Road, the tracks up there.
13	Just to give you an idea where that is.
14	Before I go into the documents,
15	I'm going to give a quick site history.
16	So the site was developed in
17	1945 by General Motors Corporation as an
18	automobile assembly plant. Operations were
19	from 1946 until they, unfortunately, closed
20	July 2009 during a bankruptcy. In July
21	2010, Fisker Automotive purchased it.
22	Then I should mention an entity,
23	Racer, came to being, which stands for
24	Revitalizing Auto Community's Environmental

Response in about 2011, and they are the 1 entity that was set up by the government 2 trust to investigate and remediate. 3 So they're charged with the old GM sites and 4 5 investigating and remediating under the 6 state's supervision. In April 2014, Wanxiang Delaware 7 Real Estate Holdings purchased it. 8 Then October 2017, Boxwood 9 10 Industrial purchased the site. So there are a number of 11 different buildings on the property: 12 The main assembly building, which was over 13 3 million square feet; the wastewater 14 treatment plant, a portion of which is still 15 left on the OU-5; pump houses and 16 17 powerhouses. 18 There's a lot of different 19 operations that took place at the site. not going to go through a full list, but 20 some of the different activities including 21 painting, filling cars with fluids, brake 22 fluids, et cetera, fueling the cars, 23 24 wastewater treatment plant for the plant.

And then a portion of OU-5, which is -- this is OU-5 in the northeast corner of the property -- was used to burn extra wood pallets, and then used as a test So those areas were -- basically, they took the pallets out. Up until the mid '60s, they would pour, you know, as was allowed at the time, they would pour an accelerant on it like acetone or something like that, put a little bit of paint on the pallets and they would burn it to get rid of the extra pallets. Other areas of the site were filled. OU-5 likely became contaminated due to the historic landfilling. Again, we're talking about -this is Operable Unit 5. This is the rest of the plan. Here's the tracks. So this is a map showing You can see it also impacted soil at OU-5. on this map over here. This green area is the Test Track. You've also got these other orange areas. That's MW-29. I can't recall which one is BH-27 and which one is 34.

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They're right here. You can see these are hot spots right here, the orange ones here, here, and these three and the green area.

They're the ones we're talking about for the soil contamination. So this one is MW-29,

BH-34 and BH-27. "BH" just means bore hole and "MW" means monitoring well.

So I'm going to talk now about

the investigation results that were done out there. So as I talk about the four exhibits, this is the July 2015 remedial investigation, I'm just going to be touching on the OU-5 results.

So in that area, there are 123 soil samples analyzed, eight monitoring wells were sampled. Soil contamination out there is metal, including antimony, arsenic, cadmium and lead.

There was a risk assessment done for a number of different pathways, and what we found was that indoor workers, outdoor workers and utility workers have a risk above the standard, which is 1 times 10 to the minus 5, and which is 1 in a 100,000

1	cancer risk and/or non-cancer risk, which is
2	called a Hazard Index of 1. We typically
3	refer to these as HSCA risk standards.
4	Anything that's above these standards would
5	require remediation. So since these were
6	above those standards, these pathways need
7	be addressed, indoor workers, outdoor
8	workers, utility workers.
9	And then there's four areas
10	identified MW-29, BH-34, BH-27 and the Test
11	Track Area. There's a map that shows the
12	four areas.
13	The groundwater contamination
14	included for metals, volatile organic
15	compounds, VOCs, and semi-volatiles. So for
16	metals, you have arsenic, barium, cobalt,
17	iron and manganese. For VOCs, you have
18	benzene and ethylbenzene. And for semi-
19	volatile organic compounds, you have
20	naphthalene.
21	
	We continue with July 2015
22	We continue with July 2015 Remedial Investigation OU-5 Results.
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and the HI of 1. I say "possible" because 1 no one is drinking the water on OU-5. 2 And then also during the RI, we 3 found out that the contamination is not 4 migrating off of OU-5. So groundwater flows 5 in this direction through the east towards 6 7 Little Mill. And so we sampled Little Mill 8 Creek during the RI. No metals or site-related contaminants above HSCA 9 standards were found in the surface water or 10 sediment. 11 12 Now, I'm going to talk about the 13 June 2017 Focused Feasibility Study, and that's where the different remedial 14 alternatives were evaluated. 15 So there's an Alternative 1, 16 17 which is no action, and that is simply done 18 as a way of comparison. That was not a 19 point that was considered because we had 20 demonstrated it as a risk. It is just done 21 as a matter of course by both DNREC and EPA. 22 Then you have Alternative 2, 23 which is excavation and offsite disposal of, basically, all soil areas. 24



1	Alternative 3, capping with
2	limited excavation and offsite disposal of
3	soil. And that would include those orange
4	hot spot areas being removed and this area
5	being capped. We'll get more into that.
6	But this area, the Test Track, capped, three
7	smaller area hot spots, soil to be removed.
8	That's Alternative 3.
9	And then 4 is where mixing of
10	the soil with different treatments.
11	And Alternative 3 was chosen
12	because it met the goals, remediation goals,
13	to be protective of human health and
14	environment and also most cost effective.
15	So I'm going to talk about
16	needing some additional studies out there
17	after the RI. A number of additional wells
18	were installed. So in November 2018, there
19	was a groundwater monitoring results report.
20	Additional wells were installed at the edge.
21	You can actually see them on this. There is
22	some additional wells in there. They were
23	down-gradient of the flow of the source
24	area.

Samples were collected. And arsenic, cobalt, iron and manganese were over risk standards.

Looking at the ecological evaluation, there is still not an impact to offsite based on the results that they found out there, and then again looking back at the RI results, it's not surprising since there are no metals, no related contaminants above the HSCA Standards in surface water or sediments.

And then it came to DNREC's attention there was a potential for building in OU-5, and so because of the building, there was -- there is some contamination in the soil and groundwater -- there is potential for that contamination to migrate from the groundwater and soil up through the ground into a building. So because of that, we asked the consultants to do an evaluation of that. So they looked at the soil and groundwater data, reevaluated to evaluate the risk. There was an area, BH-27 which is in this area, which was borderline, but we

decided that in order to just eliminate any risk, that area would be removed as well to get rid of any possible vapor intrusion risk. So at this point when that soil is removed, there will be no vapor intrusion above HSCA standards to people in that building.

So getting close to the end here. We're at the proposed plan, and this is the proposed remedy. So this is taken straight out of the proposed plan, the remedy.

So, first, was prepare a

Remedial Action Work Plan and for the four

different areas that we've identified on

page 3 that I've talked about before within

120 days of issuing the final plan. Soil

from three of the areas will be excavated

and backfilled. So these three areas here

that I mentioned previously will be

excavated and backfilled with clean soil.

And then the Test Track Area would be capped

to prevent any contact with any of those

workers, indoor, outdoor and destruction

1 workers. So at this point, it would be a temporary cap, and then in five years, the 2 building or permanent cap would have to be 3 4 placed on that. And I'll get into more about monitoring of that in just a moment. 5 Next, an Environmental Covenant, 6 which is essentially, a deed restriction 7 8 would be placed on the property. already a similar list on the other parcels 9 that have been completed, OU-1, 2 and 3, and 10 11 includes: restricting the property to commercial use only; limiting any 12 groundwater withdrawal because we talked 13 14 about the groundwater impacts; and then 15 there is also what's called a Contaminated Material Management Plan, which we also 16 refer to as a "CMMP." I'll get into that in 17 just a minute. But whoever is working 18 onsite has to follow the CMMP. 19 They're also required to follow a Long-Term Stewardship 20 Plan, which I'll get into in a minute as 21 22 well. 23 So speaking of the Long-Term 24 Stewardship Plan, LTS. The LTS is going to



include inspections of the temporary cap and permanent cap to make sure that the Test Track Area would be protected and it's going to cover the soil. There's going to be an inspection of that. There's also going to be groundwater monitoring of the perimeter wells over here and some other wells to make sure that groundwater conditions don't change and things don't migrate offsite. Ιf things do happen to change, then it would require DNREC to reevaluate what is going on and see if an additional or different remedy is needed.

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The Contaminated Materials

Management Plan, CMMP, that I mentioned
earlier, that would be particularly for
construction workers, and that would
indicate how to handle the soil and/or
groundwater that would be encountered could
be contaminated, would also indicate that
they're to prevent any soil from migrating
through the air or runoff when doing any
kind of work out there.

And then we have the Remedial



1	Action Completion Report, which just
2	documents all the remedial actions that were
3	performed at the site.
4	And then lastly, the Certificate
5	of Completion of Remedy, which is called
6	COCR, and that is the document that DNREC
7	gives to the property to be able to say that
8	all remedial actions were successfully
9	completed.

the floor. 1 2 MR. DUNN: William H. Dunn, President of Milltown-Limestone Civic 3 I'm also vice president of the Alliance. 4 Civic League for New Castle County. 5 I've been following this since 6 7 it first got going. Also, the MLCA has called for a couple of different hearings 8 9 regarding land cleanup and HSCA sites and that type stuff, and historically, it's been 10 11 a 30-day window as far as public comment. 12 If you could give that consideration. 13 In this circumstance, as noted 14 by Mr. Galloway, there are numerous bodies that come into play as far as how the costs 15 16 will be bared by the broader group as far as 17 Me and a number of officers of the cleanup. organization that I represent think a more 18 19 extensive cleanup should be considered. 20 I've attended the workshops and had discussions with some of the engineers who 21 22 participate in this process. You have Racer 23 Trust that has some funds available, General



Motors, as well as the Chinese company that

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has some ability to address environmental or some obligation to address environmental issues as well. Digging up two feet of material from that portion of the property might be a little too extensive, but nonetheless, should be considered, and a minimum should be at least a foot, which is not being proposed.

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There are any number of additional metals that were not mentioned.

I think some of the samples actually had low quantities of mercury and numerous other things that are on that property that are concerning.

The VOCs on OU-4. In the last workshop that I had a conversation with the engineers and stuff, there has been migration of VOCs that move down. They've been recognized across the street. And the natural migration across the property would be down to where he's referred to, little Millcreek, which would bring it back into OU-5. So containment is an issue.

As he mentioned that there was a



proposal for a building. So now they're proposing a temporary cap previous to the construction. Then I assume after the construction is done a permanent cap will be defined around the building and under the building.

And digging up the property, if DNREC doesn't take an active oversight of dust generated in the process, it creates problems.

And finally, the issue of deed restrictions. New Castle County has authority over all property in New Castle County. Numerous members and probably the majority of seated members of county council have adamantly spoken against New Castle County Government being held responsible for upholding deed restrictions on property. This is one of the cornerstones of what they're saying they're going to do as far as addressing the long-term concerns about pollution on that property. And that being the case, this should not move over, move forward until you get county government to



1	approve to uphold those deed
2	restrictions. You are dumping a legal
3	responsibility on them, and they have done
4	everything they could to get out from under
5	other deed restrictions of New Castle
6	County. And I can give you a list.
7	THE HEARING OFFICER: Okay.
8	MR. DUNN: I'm sure I'll have
9	further public comment.
LO	THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you,

There is a swimming pool club that's very close. There are residential homes right next to the plant and thousands and thousands of other community residential homes in the area, of which many we're not scientists, any of us, and this is a lot to absorb, and I don't know that this 15-day window is reasonable, either, for any of us to come back with whatever questions, concerns, whatever we may have, after we bring this back to our communities. That's a lot of people and a

1	lot of information for me to bring back to
2	them.
3	THE HEARING OFFICER: Okay. I
4	appreciate your concerns. Let me just add
5	this.

When this was purchased, Racer 9 did a whole sweep of the entire building to 10 take a look as far as contaminants, 11 including lead, things that are listed on 12 Asbestos I'm assuming is one of the 13 here. things that they should have looked into. 14 I have a bit of concern. 15 word from workers currently at the GM plant 16 17 that the remediation company had to stop work because of asbestos. Now, I'm assuming 18 19 they're certified workers, but they weren't 20 containing the contamination out the way. 21 I'm assuming. I'm not sure. So was that not looked into when 22 this was purchased before the demolition 23 started taking place? Because if it was, at 24



the last meeting, it was said there is no 1 2 asbestos within the whole GM plant to where we're now being told by workers they are 3 working with asbestos. And OSHA came out 5 for whatever reason. Where is the disconnect? That's my concern because, yes, 6 7 there is a lot of people around that area. You know, it's a big building. You start 8 9 demoing the building -- I don't know if you 10 guys know how asbestos works -- it becomes 11 airborne. It's extremely, extremely 12 dangerous. So that's my concern with that. 13 THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, sir. 14 15 And for the record, 'cause these kind of hearings aren't, you know, happening 16 17 every day, all of the concerns and the comments that are being incorporated into 18 19 the record by the transcript tonight, once 20 the record finally closes, I will instruct the Department to review all of the comments 21 22 and concerns that came in and I will ask 23 them to prepare a response memo regarding Once that has been completed, 24 the same.
