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1	MS. NEWMAN: Good evening. I
2	believe everyone has joined and ready to go,
3	so we will begin the virtual public hearing.
4	I want to thank you all for taking
5	time out of your day to connect with us.
6	Today's date is Wednesday, January 12, 2022.
7	We are here this evening to provide
8	a virtual hearing platform for the State of
9	Delaware's Department of Natural Resources
10	and Environmental Control to conduct this
11	public hearing on an application from Fort
12	DuPont Redevelopment and Preservation
13	Corporation for a Subaqueous Lands Permit.
14	My name is Theresa Newman, and
15	Secretary Garvin has appointed me to serve as
16	the hearing officer for tonight's formal
17	proceeding.
18	There have been changes made to
19	DNREC's standard hearing protocols
20	necessitated the by the ongoing COVID-19
21	pandemic.
22	First and foremost, this hearing is
23	being conducted virtually. Staff is not all
24	together in the same room. Everyone is

1	participating independently at their own	4
2	respective locations.	
3	While there is no sign-in sheet to	
4	document the physical attendance tonight,	
5	WebEx does generate a list of those that are	
б	virtually present so that the Department can	
7	have a record of those who are electronically	
8	joined in on this event.	
9	At the conclusion of my	
10	introductory remarks, I will be turning the	
11	hearing over to the Department staff and then	
12	to the applicant to provide formal	
13	presentations for the benefit of the hearing	
14	record being generated for the matter before	
15	us tonight.	
16	Once the presentations conclude,	
17	those persons who have preregistered prior to	
18	12:00 p.m. today will be acknowledged and	
19	will be provided the opportunity to offer	
20	comment on the proposed application in	
21	alignment with DNREC's standard comment	
22	protocols.	
23	There is a court reporter virtually	
24	present who will prepare a verbatim	

1	transcript of the hearing pursuant to the	5
2	statutory requirement for DNREC to have the	
3	same prepared. And, as always, that	
4	transcript will be posted on the hearing	
5	webpage dedicated to this matter as soon as	
6	it is received.	
7	In addition, I would encourage	
8	those who are attending tonight's hearing to	
9	also visit the hearing webpage dedicated to	
10	this matter for additional details concerning	
11	the proposed application by Fort DuPont	
12	Redevelopment and Preservation Corporation.	
13	The hearing webpage can be found	
14	online under the Administrative Law Section	
15	of DNREC's website that will be listed at the	
16	conclusion of tonight's hearing.	
17	Before we begin the presentations,	
18	please be advised of the following protocols	
19	that remain in place for all DNREC public	
20	hearings.	
21	All comment received must be	
22	limited solely to the subject matter of	
23	tonight's hearing. All comments pertinent to	
24	the subject matter of the virtual hearing

1	will be incorporated into the record being	
2	generated in this matter.	
3	In order to ensure that everyone	
4	who wishes to offer comment for the	
5	Secretary's consideration is accommodated,	
6	the record in this matter shall remain open	
7	following tonight's proceeding through	
8	Thursday, January 27, 2022.	
9	There is only one authentic record	
10	of this formal proceeding tonight, and it is	
11	the official court reporter's verbatim	
12	transcript.	
13	The statutory purpose of tonight's	
14	hearing is to build a record with regard to	
15	the proposed application before us tonight.	
16	A record consisting of the hearing	
17	transcript, all written comment, all	
18	exhibits, and eventually the Hearing	
19	Officer's Report will be reviewed by	
20	Secretary Garvin.	
21	The Secretary will ultimately issue	
22	an order following that review process	
23	containing his decision on this matter and	
24	the reason therefor.	

1	Per DNREC's standard hearing	7
2	protocols, there will be no Q and A or chat	
3	sessions permitted during this hearing.	
4	Those who preregistered to offer	
5	verbal comment will be acknowledged to speak	
6	at the conclusion of the presentation portion	
7	of tonight's proceedings.	
8	Additional instructions with regard	
9	to offering regarding the verbal comment	
10	tonight will be provided at that time.	
11	It is important to note no decision	
12	has already been made by the Department, nor	
13	will any decision be made tonight with regard	
14	to the proposed application.	
15	As previously stated, DNREC wishes	
16	to ensure that everyone is enabled to offer	
17	their comment for inclusion into the record	
18	being generated in this matter. Therefore,	
19	the record will remain open through Thursday,	
20	January 27, 2022 so that the public may offer	
21	written comments, should they wish to do so.	
22	Comments may be submitted through a	
23	comment web form link on the hearing webpage,	
24	via e-mail to	

1	DNRECHearingComments@delaware.gov, or via the	8
2	U.S. Postal Services at the physical address	
3	for DNREC indicated on the hearing webpage	
4	and/or the public notices previously issued	
5	in this matter.	
6	Written comments to DNREC may not	
7	be submitted by using any social media	
8	platform such as Twitter, Facebook, YouTube,	
9	or text messaging.	
10	Please remember that all comment	
11	received either through USPS or the	
12	electronic mechanisms just noted now, as long	
13	as received by the Department on or before	
14	January 27th, will bear the exact same weight	
15	and will be considered equally by the	
16	Secretary prior to making his final decision	
17	to this matter.	
18	Lastly, the ultimate decision	
19	regarding this matter is made by DNREC's	
20	Secretary Garvin. This formal hearing	
21	tonight acts as a mechanism to enable the	
22	Department to thoroughly vet the application	
23	matter to the public and to let the public	
24	know the various ways which comment may be	

1	submitted for Secretary Garvin's	9
2	consideration if so desired.	
3	I will now hand it over to	
4	Mrs. Bobola with the Division of Water to	
5	provide the Department's presentation.	
6	MS. BOBOLA: Thank you, Theresa.	
7	My name is Rebecca Bobola. I'm an	
8	Environmental Scientist with the Wetlands and	
9	Situation Lands Section of DNREC. And we	
10	will go through our presentation showing the	
11	application as submitted by the applicant.	
12	Okay. The purpose of the public	
13	hearing: To provide the public an	
14	opportunity to comment on Fort DuPont	
15	Redevelopment and Preservation Corporation's	
16	application to install approximately 1,600	
17	linear feet of rip-rap revetment for	
18	shoreline stabilization. This application is	
19	for a subaqueous lands permit.	
20	On this slide, visible is the	
21	approximate project location with the start	
22	and end points represented by the yellow	
23	stars located centrally on the slide.	
24	Here is another representation of	

1	the approximate project location, again	10
2	represented with the start and end points	
3	with the yellow stars and the orange line	
4	representing roughly the location of the	
5	rip-rap revetment, and this one in respect to	
6	the surrounding parcels seen by the faint	
7	yellow lines.	
8	This is located at 260 Old Elm	
9	Avenue, Delaware City, New Castle County,	
10	Delaware.	
11	This application was placed on	
12	public notice, a 20-day public notice period	
13	published in two state publications, the	
14	Delaware State News and the News Journal from	
15	October 13, 2021 to November 2, 2021.	
16	In response to the public notice,	
17	we received one written comment in objection	
18	requesting a public hearing.	
19	For the project overview, visible	
20	on this slide is the entire scope of work for	
21	this application from a plan view. Again,	
22	this is to install approximately 1,600 linear	
23	feet of rip-rap revetment for shoreline	
24	stabilization. The beginning it begins	

1	where the boat ramp bulkhead ends and extends	11
2	south along the bank.	
3	Broken down in segments here, this	
4	is roughly the first third, and then Cross	
5	Section A-A, as submitted.	
6	This is the central third of the	
7	plan view, if you will, and Cross Section B-B	
8	as submitted.	
9	And, finally, this is the final	
10	third of the plan view located at the left of	
11	the screen, and then Cross Section C-C and	
12	Cross Section D-D. Cross Section C-C	
13	illustrates the existing culvert that can be	
14	seen.	
15	As part of the application review	
16	process, it goes under regulatory review	
17	through DNREC Division of Water, Wetlands and	
18	Subaqueous Lands Section.	
19	I conducted a desktop review to	
20	determine if the proposed structure is	
21	consistent with regulatory requirements as it	
22	pertains to the scope of work.	
23	Theresa, I would like to introduce	
24	my exhibits at this time.

1	MS. NEWMAN: Go ahead.	12
2	MS. BOBOLA: Exhibit 1: The state	
3	laws and regulations regarding subaqueous	
4	lands.	
5	Exhibit 2: Subaqueous Lands Permit	
б	Application as originally submitted and as	
7	revised.	
8	Exhibit 3: Public notice as	
9	published in the Delaware State News and in	
10	the News Journal and as posted on the	
11	Delaware Public Meeting calendar and on the	
12	DNREC website.	
13	Exhibit 4: DNREC public hearing	
14	presentation.	
15	Exhibit 5: Comments received prior	
16	to the public hearing.	
17	Exhibit 6: The Army Corps of	
18	Engineer canal easement.	
19	Exhibit 7: America's Water and	
20	Infrastructure Act of 2018, section 1331(F).	
21	Exhibit 8: Letter received from	
22	the applicant on January 12, '22.	
23	This concludes my presentation at	
24	this time.	

1	These are the means of submitting	13
2	comment that Theresa presented at the	
3	beginning of the presentation, individual for	
4	anyone that might need them.	
5	MS. NEWMAN: Thank you, Ms. Bobola.	
6	We have received the Department's exhibits as	
7	you have presented, and I do hereby mark the	
8	exhibits as Department's Exhibits 1 through	
9	8.	
10	Ms. Bobola, I'm going to place you	
11	on mute, and we will move on to the	
12	applicant's representative to provide their	
13	presentation.	
14	MS. BOBOLA: Thank you.	
15	MR. DOWNARD: Thank you, Theresa.	
16	MS. NEWMAN: Mr. Downard, you may	
17	proceed with the presentation.	
18	MR. DOWNARD: I still don't have	
19	the shared.	
20	MS. NEWMAN: Oh, I'm sorry.	
21	Gotcha. And Mr. Downard, for the record if	
22	you could just give your first and last name	
23	and what company you are with or how you are	
24	representing the applicants.	

1	MR. DOWNARD: Yes. My name is	14
2	Ralph Downard. I'm a Senior Project Manager	
3	with Duffield Associates. And we are the	
4	authorized agent for the applicant, the Fort	
5	DuPont Redevelopment Preservation	
б	Corporation.	
7	MS. NEWMAN: Thank you. You should	
8	have the presenter role to share your screen.	
9	MR. DOWNARD: All right. Good	
10	evening, everybody. Again, this is just an	
11	introductory slide stating that this	
12	presentation is for the Fort DuPont	
13	Redevelopment and Preservation Corporation	
14	for impacts associated to the Delaware City	
15	Branch Channel Revetment dated January 12,	
16	2022.	
17	Here is an agenda of this	
18	presentation. I am first going to discuss a	
19	little of the project history, provide some	
20	project overview, provide a summary of the	
21	public comments, go into a little discussion	
22	of the Subaqueous Land Permit, and then also	
23	to discuss the project benefits.	
24	So the project history, as I guess	

1	it's kind of described as planning for the	15
2	future.	
3	The Fort DuPont Redevelopment and	
4	Preservation Corporation was established by	
5	Delaware Legislation by House Bill 310 in	
6	July 2014 to preserve and protect the	
7	recreational amenities of Fort DuPont and to	
8	make capital improvements to the 325-acre	
9	campus.	
10	The Delaware City Branch Canal:	
11	The branch canal is in the process of being	
12	transferred to the Fort DuPont Redevelopment	
13	and Preservation Corporation, the State of	
14	Delaware, through the America's Water	
15	Infrastructure Act of 2018.	
16	Project Overview: This is a	
17	similar slide that was presented to DNREC,	
18	just trying, just generally showing the	
19	extent of the project from the bulkhead of	
20	the boat ramp to the east, extending just	
21	short of the Fifth Street bridge which is	
22	just shown off screen here to the west.	
23	This is more of a plan view from	
24	the bridge showing generally the existing	

		16
1	conditions of the branch canal. And the left	
2	hand side, obviously, being Delaware City,	
3	and the right hand side of the photograph	
4	being the Fort DuPont.	
5	The revetment project is located	
6	along the Delaware City Branch Canal, as	
7	demonstrated on the aerial photograph,	
8	between the DNREC boat ramp bulkhead and the	
9	Ninth Street bridge.	
10	The revetment project will rebuild	
11	the former rip-rap armored slope.	
12	The original armored slope has	
13	deteriorated by erosion and is no longer	
14	serviceable. This erosion is threatening the	
15	stability of the adjacent lands. In	
16	addition, the sediments entering the branch	
17	canal channel from this slope could obstruct	
18	boat traffic.	
19	Here is a photograph near the	
20	western end of the existing channel, branch	
21	channel. And you can see by the leaning	
22	trees here evidence of the erosion that's	
23	taking place.	
24	This is a closeup of a similar area	

1	of banks, and you can see the trees starting	17
2	to fall into the channel and erosion that's	
3	taking place.	
4	This slide shows an existing	
5	condition of the branch channel, and these	
6	are some of the remnants of the preexisting	
7	channel stabilization.	
8	So this application is considered a	
9	new application, a new project, because these	
10	existing features are no longer serviceable.	
11	The revetment project will impact	
12	1,600 linear feet of the bank. 5,363 plus or	
13	minus cubic yards of rip-rap will be placed	
14	along the bank and impact 0.82 plus or minus	
15	acres of regulated waters.	
16	The rip-rap will be placed on	
17	geotextile fabric with no modifications to	
18	the existing slope and no backfill or	
19	dredging.	
20	The erosion and sediment control	
21	plans for the revetment and adjoining lands	
22	was approved by DNREC on December 15, 2021.	
23	We wanted to discuss some of the	
24	public comments which we have received as	

	18
1	part of this presentation. One of the
2	comments received was or, actually,
3	several of the comments received dealt with
4	the Section 106 review, which deals with
5	historical and cultural resources.
6	A Section 106 review has been
7	initiated as part of the U.S. Army Corps of
8	Engineers Section 404 and Section 408 permit
9	applications.
10	The Delaware Division of Historic
11	and Cultural Affairs has been notified.
12	A phase one archeological
13	evaluation has been completed.
14	The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers'
15	staff archaeologist is also reviewing the
16	applications and coordinating with the State
17	Historic and Cultural Affairs Office to
18	ensure that no historic artifacts are
19	impacted without being properly documented.
20	The Section 106 review process is
21	required for federal projects and is not a
22	DNREC issue, which is why no discussion was
23	included with this permit application.
24	Another comment received concerning

1	the project was dealing with project	19
1 2		
	aesthetics. We wanted to demonstrate with	
3	virtually the exact same project which	
4	occurred on the Delaware City side of the	
5	branch channel.	
б	And this photograph on the left	
7	shows the construction after, just a	
8	photograph showing the site after	
9	construction. And this photograph shows what	
10	it looks like three years after construction,	
11	where virtually all the rip-rap is no longer	
12	visible.	
13	There is also comments concerning	
14	about the existing trees being removed at the	
15	top of the bank. These trees will be removed	
16	as part of the construction of the promenade,	
17	so whether the revetment project occurs or	
18	not, those trees will be removed.	
19	There is also some comments about	
20	some errors made with the application. Lines	
21	4 and 16 of the basic application contradicts	
22	line one of Appendix 1 concerning new versus	
23	repair and replace. This contradiction was	
24	corrected, and the proposed revetment is

     considered a new activity.
 2
               The measurement listed on Line 5 of
     the basic application, which states 2,000
 3
 4
     linear feet of shoreline stabilization, is
     not consistent with Line 2 of Appendix 1,
 5
     which states 1,600 linear feet of shoreline
 6
     stabilization. This contradiction was
 7
 8
     corrected, and now 1,600 is listed in both
 9
     locations.
10
               Line 19 of the basic application,
11
     the box that affirmatively designates the
12
     listed authorized agent was not checked. The
     box has now been checked.
13
               On Line 8D on Appendix 1, or I,
14
     excuse me, it has been revised to indicate
15
     that a geotextile fabric is now going to be
16
17
     placed behind the rip-rap.
18
               Concern was raised about the
     two-to-one slope listed on Appendix 1, Lines
19
     8E and 8F, when compared with the actual
20
21
     measurements on the cross sections provided
22
     with the application.
23
               In response, a plus-minus indicated
     some variation was added to these cross
24
```

		21
1	sections to account for minor deviations that	
2	will likely occur when working in a field.	
3	Oops. I'm sorry. The revised	
4	applications containing these revisions was	
5	submitted to DNREC on January 11, 2022 and	
6	posted.	
7	Other comments were received.	
8	Detailed responses to all of these revised,	
9	received comments were provided to DNREC on	
10	January 12, 2022.	
11	The Subaqueous Lands Permit	
12	Application: I am going to go through the	
13	same basic slides that were presented by	
14	DNREC, one showing the plan view and then	
15	showing the cross section.	
16	I wanted to point out in this cross	
17	section that the design assumes that the	
18	layer of rip-rap is fairly uniform, as	
19	opposed to the way the DNREC calculation is	
20	done where they assume more of a triangular,	
21	web-shaped configuration.	
22	So this shows the eastern end of	
23	the project nearest the boat ramp and showing	
24	the Cross Section A-A. This is the central	

1	section showing Cross Section B-B. And,	22
2	again, the thickness of the rip-rap remains	
3	the same.	
4	This cross section and plan view	
5	shows the cross section over the existing	
6	outfall structure demonstrated, shown here in	
7	both locations, and the existing rip-rap	
8	blanket.	
9	And the last slide here in this	
10	section shows the western extent of the	
11	revetment project and then the plan view, as	
12	well.	
13	The project benefits: Maintain	
14	so the project benefits is to maintain the	
15	branch channel geometry, reduce the slope	
16	sloughing into the channel, and thus maintain	
17	boat traffic, repair erosion pockets	
18	throughout the slope, protect the	
19	infrastructure along the top of the banks,	
20	along the top of the slope, which includes	
21	the public access promenade, houses, and the	
22	site infrastructure.	
23	This concludes the applicant's	
24	presentation, and we would like this to be	

1	entered into the record. Thank you.	23
2	MS. NEWMAN: Thank you,	
3	Mr. Downard. If you will, after the hearing,	
4	please provide Rebecca with the presentation,	
5	the electronic version, and we will post that	
6	online.	
7	So as you presented this	
8	presentation as the applicant's exhibit, I do	
9	hereby mark this as Applicant's Exhibit 1.	
10	And that does conclude your presentation,	
11	Mr. Downard?	
12	MR. DOWNARD: Yes. Thank you.	
13	MS. NEWMAN: Okay. Thank you. And	
14	just real quick before we begin the public	
15	comment portion, Mr. Randall, I just want to	
16	check with you to make sure you have nothing	
17	to add to the presentation?	
18	MR. RANDOL: I apologize. I was on	
19	mute.	
20	MS. NEWMAN: That's okay.	
21	MR. RANDOL: No. Thanks for	
22	asking, though. I'm good with the	
23	presentation.	
24	MS. NEWMAN: Okay. Great. Thank	

		24
1	you. And I'm also going to ask Mr. Gorski	
2	I will unmute you also was there anything	
3	that you would like to add to the applicant's	
4	presentation?	
5	MR. GORSKI: No. Ralph covered all	
б	the technical elements pretty well, so I	
7	don't have anything else to add. Thank you.	
8	MS. NEWMAN: Wonderful. Thank you.	
9	Okay. So we are going to go ahead and move	
10	forward to public comment, now that the	
11	presentations have concluded.	
12	And those who have preregistered	
13	are going to be given the opportunity to	
14	offer the verbal comment tonight.	
15	And so per the protocol set forth	
16	in DNREC's public hearing webpage, those	
17	wishing to have offered a verbal comment	
18	during the virtual hearing must have	
19	preregistered with DNREC no later than noon	
20	of the day of the hearing.	
21	With that being said, all	
22	commenters must adhere to the Department's	
23	protocols with regard to offering verbal	
24	comment, including making their comments as	

		25
1	concise as possible, respecting the	
2	three-minute time limit, and limiting their	
3	comments to the subject matter of this	
4	hearing.	
5	To assist the commenter with	
6	regards to the amount of time they have,	
7	there is a visual timer that you will see on	
8	the screen. When it is that speaker's turn	
9	to comment, that speaker's audio will be	
10	unmuted, and their identity will be	
11	confirmed, and the timer will begin.	
12	At the end of the three minutes,	
13	the speaker's audio will automatically be	
14	placed back on mute.	
15	Please note that there is no live	
16	video feed of the commenter, as they will	
17	provide a comment by audio only.	
18	All comments will be transcribed by	
19	the court reporter and thereby incorporated	
20	into the hearing record.	
21	If the speaker is not able to	
22	finish their comment within the three-minute	
23	time allotted, the Department encourages you	
24	to submit the completed comment in writing no	

1	later than January 27th.
2	With that being said, there is only
3	one commenter that has registered to provide
4	comment at tonight's hearing. May I have
5	Mr. Tim Konkus unmuted? And when we do so,
б	please state your name and who you represent
7	for the record, if any, and then you may
8	begin your comment, Mr. Konkus.
9	MR. KONKUS: Good evening. My name
10	is Tim Konkus. I live at 302 Canal Street.
11	And I represent myself.
12	I want to thank DNREC for the
13	thoughtful review of these public hearing
14	comments, as they help resolve many issues in
15	the application.
16	I believe that this application,
17	with as many corrections as has been made,
18	still needs to be resubmitted, and it should
19	address the project benefits that are
20	important to the community, the first being
21	the historic nature of the Delaware City
22	Branch Channel as the only remaining portion
23	of the historic C&D Canal.
24	Any company with the name

26

1	"preservation" in its title should fully	27
2	embrace the historic nature of this canal	
3	when they expect to ruin, potentially ruin,	
4	every artifact that remains in the canal.	
5	Second, it's nice to know that	
6	someone is concerned about the artifacts and	
7	how they will be preserved. However, that	
8	needs to become public knowledge and not just	
9	published on the 15th of December after my	
10	previous comments.	
11	Third, the new plan needs to	
12	address the high level of aesthetic appeal to	
13	the residents and visitors along the Delaware	
14	City waterfront.	
15	Right now, we are promised nothing	
16	other than a spillway that you could find in	
17	any area of the country, and it doesn't	
18	address the historic nature nor any aesthetic	
19	aspect.	
20	Fifth or fourth this plan	
21	should be a definitive match between the bona	
22	fide bids that are received to construct the	
23	project matched against the organization's	
24	annual funding.	

1	Fifth, it should provide the	28
2	empirical location of the horizontal	
3	benchmarks used in the engineering drawings	
4	so anyone can determine how far into the	
5	waterway this project is going to extend.	
6	Sixth, the new plan needs to	
7	address how there will be no backfill	
8	required to complete the project at grade.	
9	It defies logic that there will be no	
10	dredging and there will be no backfill to put	
11	this slope as it's envisioned and make those	
12	corrections.	
13	Seven, the new plan must contain a	
14	sediment and erosion control plan. In the	
15	notes it says it was finalized in this year,	
16	but that has not been made public to anyone,	
17	and that needs to happen, and it needs to be	
18	part of this application.	
19	And eighth, how the project will be	
20	a collaborative effort to ensure the safe,	
21	open, and free navigation of the channel	
22	during and after the project to include	
23	acknowledgment by the applicant that he will	
24	coordinate with U.S. Coast Guard on its
