PROCEEDINGS

MS. VEST: The time is now 6 p.m. It is Wednesday, January 24, 2024, and we are here to provide the virtual platform for DNREC to have and conduct its formal public hearing for the solid waste permit that is currently pending before the Department for Scrap Tire Solution. Their permit is for their facility located in Wilmington, Delaware. For those who may not recognize me, my name is Lisa Vest, and Secretary Garvin has designated me to serve as hearing officer for tonight's proceedings.

A few introductory remarks before we get into the meat of tonight's proceedings. I do need to remind everybody that, pursuant to DNREC's standard hearing protocols, this hearing is being conducted virtually. While there are no sign-in sheets like we would normally have in the past or a physical recordkeeping of those in attendance, the Zoom platform does do that automatically, so the Department keeps a record of those who have taken the time to attend tonight's hearing. And again, I thank you for taking time out of your busy schedule to do so.

What we're going to do before I get into the parameters of tonight's hearing is to turn

the screen briefly over to one of our administrative specialists at DNREC. Tanesha is going to take a couple of minutes very quickly to make sure that those of you in attendance are aware of the closed captioning that Zoom provides and to make sure we all know how to operate it so you can get the most out of tonight's proceedings. So Tanesha, if you are able, please go ahead and do that at this time.

MS. PERRY: Hello. My name is Tanesha
Perry. I'm an Administrative Specialist III with the
Office of the Secretary. I'm here to assist the
Hearing Officer tonight. I'd like to make sure
everyone is aware that the Zoom platform we're using
has the ability for closed captioning in multiple
languages. To start closed captioning if you.re using
a computer, at the bottom of your screen, you should
see a "Show Captions" button.

If you do not see the "Show Captions" button, you may have to select the three dots that says "More." Once you find your "Show Captions" button, you should click your carrot pointing up, which will bring up the translation options. You can select your preferred language from there. If your preferred language isn't listed, you can select

Once the settings page comes up, located at the very bottom, select "Translation Language." From there, you'll be able to select your preferred language, then select "Done" at the top right corner, and then "Done" again.

If the captions are not automatically popping up yet, you may need to select "Captions" again and select "Show Captions." Now I'll turn it back over to Hearing Officer Lisa Vest.

MS. VEST: Thank you, Tanesha. As I mentioned, I'm going to go over some brief parameters before we get into the presentations that you all will be seeing tonight. There will be two presentations tonight. There will be one given on behalf of the Department, kind of like a how we got here tonight kind of thing, so that you all understand exactly what is pending before the Department with regard to this permit. And then, once the Department's presentation

is done, I will be turning the floor over to the
Applicant. Scrap Tire Solution has a brief
presentation that they would like to give as well.

Once we get done with the presentations, the hearing will then proceed to the public comment portion of tonight's hearing. Pursuant to DNREC's standard hearing protocol, we do have pre-registration enforced for anybody that wishes to offer a live comment at our hearings. The live comment -- well, the ability, rather, to offer live comment -- is headed up by the pre-registration process, and that process always closes at noon on the date of the hearing.

For tonight's hearing, we have six individuals who have pre-registered to speak, and again, when we get done with both presentations, we will be turning the floor over to them. Each person will have up to three minutes to offer their comments for the record, and I'll say a little bit more about that before we begin that.

I do want to set the parameters, as I said, for tonight's hearing. First and foremost, this is a formal legal proceeding. It is not a town hall meeting; it is not a public workshop or public

information session. It is a very formal proceeding. The purpose is to provide the platform for the public to learn more about this permit that's pending before the Secretary right now and again, for the opportunity for those who have pre-registered to offer a comment. So again, I thank everybody for taking the time to join us tonight.

regarding this matter, whether they're received verbally at the hearing tonight, whether they've already come in, or whether they come in between now and the time that the record closes for receipt of public comment, they're all going to bear the same weight. And as long as they pertain to the subject matter at hand, which again are the Scrap Tire Solution's permit application that is pending, it will be incorporated into the record.

Everything that you see tonight, along with all the comments that come in, are posted for the public's view on the hearing webpage dedicated to this matter at DNREC. Every hearing that goes through the Zoom process, like we are doing tonight, has its own hearing webpage. You can find that if you go to the DNREC website, click on -- go to the Administrative

Law tab that you'll see across the screen. When you click on Admin Law, you will see a sub-pocket called "Public Hearings." You can click on that, and they're all up there chronologically, with the most recent hearings first. So it's pretty easy to find.

We have a couple hearings that are going on currently this week and next. So this one is not right at the top, but it's very close to the top.

And once again, I would encourage everybody, if you haven't already done so, to go to the hearing page, check it out, watch the comments that come in, and feel free to take advantage of all of that information when you're formulating your own comments because there is a lot there.

With regard to the protocols for tonight's hearing, briefly, number one: all comment received must be limited solely to the subject matter of tonight's hearing; I've already mentioned to that. And again, when the comments come in, they are immediately posted on the hearing webpage for everyone to see. Secondly, in order to ensure that everyone that wishes to offer comment is accommodated to do so, the record will not close tonight, but rather it's going to remain open. And again, all comment bears

the same weight, whether it comes in tonight or whether it comes in all the way up through February 23rd, which is how long the record stays open. So pretty much you've got an entire month to take advantage of all that information on the hearing page and look it over before you make your comment.

Moving along. Okay. Somebody must have their sound up a lot because I'm hearing some feedback. Number three, there is only one authentic recording of tonight's proceedings, and it is the court reporter. They will be, pursuant to DNREC's statutory obligation to do so, providing a verbatim transcript of the hearing tonight. And once we get that from Veritext, it will be posted on the hearing webpage as well.

Lastly, it's important to realize that no decision has been made by anyone tonight regarding this pending permit. The Department has not come to any conclusions; the Secretary has not come to any conclusions. Again, we are here tonight simply to provide the platform to make the public aware that this matter is currently pending and also to provide the platform to offer comment should those who wish to pre-register wish to do so.

So that being said, I am now going to turn it over to department staff from the Division of Waste and Hazardous Substances. They have a brief presentation to kind of explain the permit that's pending right now. Doug, when you're ready, you may proceed.

MR. GODFREY: Thank you. Good evening. My name is Doug Godfrey, and I'm with the Division of Waste and Hazardous Substances. I will be outlining the documents that Scrap Tire Solution ("STS") has submitted for their solid waste permit. The facility will accept only scrap tires and Bobcat tracks for processing, bundling them for transport to a tire recycler.

All vehicles transporting solid waste from this facility shall have a valid Delaware Solid Waste Transporter Permit issued by the Department. The total facility volume will be no more than 375 tons. The process that took place was the initial application was received by DNREC on May 9, 2023. We provided comments back to STS on June 14th. The application documents submitted -- additional application documents were submitted for review on July 25th. Comments were provided back to STS on

August 15th. A complete application was received on December 6th of 2023, and public notice of the application was published on December 10th 2023.

2.4

The Division of Waste and Hazardous Substances is the last permit to be issued by the Department. Once all of the other permits have been issued, Waste reviews a final submission and modifies the permit to be an operations permit. There are several items that were included in the application. They included a lease zoning verification, permits needed, a plan of operation governing all the onsite facility operations, evidence of no adverse risk, a verification of market, or a letter of intent, a conceptual closure plan, and a financial assurance to cover the potential need for DNREC to close the facility.

In addition, we have placed on the public hearing website the following 19 exhibits for the application process. Finally, my contact information is on this screen, and you can contact me if you have questions.

MS. VEST: Okay. Great. Thank you,
Doug. Just a couple questions to make sure that the

MS. VEST: Okay. Let the record reflect that Department Exhibits 1 through 19, I believe, that were just put up on the board are hereby entered into the hearing record. Does the Division have anything further that they wish to offer at this time?

So what we're doing is we save 5 6 tires from ending up in landfills, polluting the earth, and causing environmental hazards. So when 7 8 tires are laying on the ground or in a pile, they can 9 collect water and become breeding grounds for 10 mosquitoes, and that's one of the things that we're able to make sure that does not happen. 11

We have downstream partners that recycle all parts of the tire and those raw materials are used in power construction and industrial applications. We're essentially located where a shipping facility is easily accessible to the parts along the east coast over there at 195 Hay Road. There are different problems again with the tires. There's leaching, meaning chemicals that can go into the ground.

Mosquitoes, as I just explained, and also combustibility, where tires that are loose can catch on fire and they're very hard to put out. Our solution is to take the tires -- collect tires in our

facility, and we will be baling them or bundling them with a machine that compresses the tires and puts them in a bale and loading those bales into sea containers for our customers, a very simple process.

mentioned, the tires do collect water when they are laying on the ground or in piles. And as we know, when that water gets warm, that is a huge breeding ground for mosquitoes, and that is a major problem as far as tire piles go. And when we put the tires in a bale or when we do the baling process, the reason why it's not as combustible as they are when they're laying there loose is that once they're in bales, then they're tightly compressed, oxygen cannot penetrate the bale to add fuel to a fire, for instance. So we take away that problem when we put the tires in bales. Am I going too fast?

MS. VEST: No, you're fine.

MR. GONZALEZ: Okay, perfect. Next steps: bale tires are shipped overseas, which is U.K., Canada, India, and other countries. There's a process called "pyrolysis" to specific -- or specially burn the tire bales to create energy. This energy is used to fuel motors, engines, and factories and also

creates byproducts which are either recyclable or reusable. The slide that we're looking at here is basically tires. It goes into the pyrolysis plant and what is left over after the plant is done using the tires for energy is black carbon dust, steel wire.

There's also polyester that's in the tires, and there is an alternate fuel, or a black goo if you will, that is fuel that these other countries use to run their factory's generators and plants. And that is it.

That is what we do.

MS. VEST: Okay, Eric. Thank you very much for that presentation. And just as a side again, I have already advised the applicant that I am going to enter this presentation in as part of the hearing record. I'm going to mark it at this point for the record as Applicant's Exhibit Number 1, and it is already up on the hearing webpage that we've been talking about.

(Exhibit 1 was marked for identification.)

So again, if those in attendance haven't had the opportunity, please do take the opportunity to go to that webpage and check it out.

You'll find all the exhibits that were referenced in

the PowerPoints. Each is downloadable, and you can read them at your leisure, as well as the applicant's presentation that we just saw. And again, Eric, I thank you for that.

MR. RICHARDSON: Great. Thank you very much. Hello. My name is Jeffrey Richardson with the Delaware Community Benefits Agreement Coalition. According to DRNEC's website on scrap tire management: "Scrap tire piles present a number of environmental, health, and safety hazards to our communities. are ideal breeding grounds for mosquitoes. A tire fire started by arson or a lightning strike could take days, even weeks, to extinguish because burning rubber is extremely difficult to put out. The smoke from a tire fire contains hazardous gases and the oily liquid runoff from the melted tires can pollute ground water." Last year -- that's end of quote.

Edgemoor location on Hay Road experienced the dumping of 10,000 tons of tires at a lot on Hay Road a few parcels up from the proposed site of the Scrap Tire Solution's facility. We experienced insecurity of living with an enormous illegal time bomb that could have made many communities unlivable if a fire had occurred. The existing safe guards and protections did not protect the public.

Now we face a permit request for a

permanent facility that uses scrap tires as its primary product source. Scrap Tire's statement on safety is very thin, given the potential air, water, and life quality threat represented by the facility. The New Castle County Office of Public Works raised additional concerns in their January 23, 2024 letter: "The proposed scrap tire area appears to be located near the County's 66-inch sanitary sewer force main and within the County's 30-foot easement area of the force main. The force main must remain protected and easily accessible at all times should an emergency arise.

"This will not be the case if there are 20 containers of tires located on top of the main force. Has there been any analysis to determine the effect, the weight of the containers, baling equipment, and heavy equipment will have on the force main below? Without additional information, the County cannot support the location of the scrap tire area bordering the pump station parcel and over the main force."

There are environmental justice communities near the proposed facility location. They are impacted by numerous facilities that release

1 toxins into the air. The Scrap Tire facility will add additional unhealthy air levels related to diesel or 3 truck emissions. Cumulative impact of proposed facilities operations has not been considered; 4 5 therefore, we cannot agree to the signing of the Scrap 6 Tire Solution's facility. Finally, public 7 participation must be expanded to deepen this process. I will submit additional information and comments via 8 9 the website and through the proper channels. 10 thank you very much for this time. And again, this 11 was Jeffrey Richardson with the Delaware Community 12 Benefits Agreement Coalition. Thank you. 13 MS. VEST: Thank you very much, 14 Mr. Richardson, appreciate that. MR. HAHN: Okay. I'm also a resident of North Wilmington in North Hills. And I'm a recreational user of the Delaware River and its shorelines. Concerned about environmental quality and conservation of natural resources and restoration along the Delaware River especially in New Castle County. First became aware of the permit project of the DRNEC solid waste public notice. Not sure what other permits were required. Due to the illegal tire disposal in Edgemoor that occurred with the port project, I was concerned about more tires in the area.

I feel that this DNREC public notice system is not that effective in communication and

outreach in general. Three minutes is not a lot of time. I'll try to get through these. It was indicated it's not a public meeting, it's a legal process, so you can't ask questions. There's a lot of mistrust. You know, as mentioned, Hay Road is an area that presents EJ issues; there's a lot of cumulative impacts, and you know, these just aren't addressed efficiently by DNREC.

So therefore, I requested a public meeting and consultation with Councilman Cartier who could not make the meeting tonight. Subsequently, Councilman Cartier and I met with Eric Gonzalez. I also did some research on the technology as well before meeting with him. Mr. Gonzalez provided a lot of information and offered to have a community meeting, which isn't required as I just mentioned.

Mr. Gonzalez is a local resident of
North Wilmington in Councilman Cartier's district and
demonstrated a willingness to work with the community.
He offered to help solve a big community problem at
Edgemoor with the illegal tire disposal and in the
county and in the region with waste tire ports. As a
result of the meeting, Councilman Cartier and I
support Mr. Gonzalez and ask to have the public

hearing request retracted.

This is a lot in due to consequences related to the DNREC schedule and time impacts it would have on starting to remove tires. As mentioned, Mr. Gonzalez has offered to remove the tires illegally disposed at Edgemoor. DNREC should be a better community partner, especially on Hay Road. The community wants a healthier Delaware River coastline along Hay Road. We recommend that the permit be approved and Mr. Gonzalez be allowed to start work as soon as possible.

It is concerning that beneficial projects as this one and projects like dam removal on the Brandywine take years and large amounts of money. While at the same time, major projects like the port expansions seem to be fast-tracked and shortchanged in terms of environmental review. Lastly, Mr. Gonzalez indicated that this project will be helpful to the city and county in managing waste tires — illegally tires. He even indicated he could solve the problems at Edgemoor. The process will be on already-developed property in a towing lot. I visited the site and the environmental impact will be minimal.

Tires will not be stockpiled onsite.

- 1 Tires will not be brought in from faraway. There is a market for their reuse. Increased truck traffic has 3 been studied. There's relatively minimal addition from this. However, the cumulative study is needed 4 5 and should be presented to the community on truck 6 traffic. And that's what I have. Thank you. recommend and thank Mr. Gonzalez for meeting and look 7 8 forward to future engagement with him.
 - MS. VEST: Thank you, sir, I appreciate that. We're going to go back up now and see if we can find the two pre-registrants that first time around we couldn't find. If more trucks are introduced, it's going to become a major safety hazard for vehicles getting on 495 at Edgemoor Road; that is my concern.

Now, we're wanting to put up a processing plant for tires, which is going to put 4 more chemicals into the air and the risk of 5 6 mosquitoes, any kind of flying insect. The risk of 7 fire -- and even though they're keeping it indoors, 8 there's still going to be a risk of fire. And the 9 fact that they can't put them out, they have to let 10 them burn, which means my neighborhood is at risk, and 11 we are a low-income neighborhood.
