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PROCEEDINGS

THE HEARING OFFICER: Good evening.

The time is now 6 p.m. It is Wednesday, December 13,

2023, and we are going to go ahead and start tonight's proceedings.

I want to thank everybody for taking their time out of their busy Christmas schedules and holiday plans to join us. We are here this evening, as the screen says, to provide the formal platform for the Department to present its proposed amendments to the State of Delaware Wildlife Regulations.

For those that may not recognize me, my name is Lisa Vest. And Secretary Garvin has designated me to serve as the hearing officer for tonight's proceedings.

Pursuant to DNREC standard hearing protocol, this meeting is being conducted virtually. While there are no physical sign-in sheets any more to speak of, the Zoom platform does generate an attendance sheet so the Department can keep track of those who have joined us here tonight, whether they're here to offer comment or just tune in to see what the proposed amendments are.

And again I thank everyone for taking

1 | the time out of their busy schedules to be here.

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Before I set the parameters for tonight's proceedings, I do want to turn it over to Virginia Jackson. Virginia is an administrative specialist with the Office of the Secretary at DNREC. And she has a brief run-through of how you can best utilize the platform that Zoom has for us tonight, specifically with closed captioning capabilities.

So, Virginia, you can take it away when ready.

MS. JACKSON: Thank you. Good evening, everyone. My name is Virginia Jackson. I'm the administrative specialist with the Office of the Secretary, here to assist the hearing officer tonight.

I'd like to make sure everyone is aware that the Zoom platform we're using has the ability for closed captioning in multiple languages. To start closed captioning, if you're using a computer, at the bottom of your screen you should see a "show captions" button. If you do not see the "show captions" button, you may have to select the three dots that say "more."

Once you find your "show captions" button, you should click the carrot pointing up, which will bring up your translation options. You can

select your preferred language from there. If your preferred language is not listed, you can select "more," and all of the languages will be listed.

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If you're on a smartphone, at the bottom of your screen, select the "captions" button indicated by "CC." If your preferred language is not listed at the bottom, you may have to select the three dots that say "more." You should then select "meeting settings" with the gear icon next to it. Once the settings page comes up, located at the very bottom, select "translation language."

From there, you'll be able to select your preferred language. Then select "done" at the top right corner, and then "done" again. If the captions are not automatically popping up yet, you may need to select the "captions" again, and select "show captions."

Now I'll turn it back over to Hearing
Officer Lisa Vest.

THE HEARING OFFICER: Thanks, Virginia.

As I said before, I just have a few introductory remarks. And then I will be turning the floor, so to speak, over to Joe Rogerson. He will be giving the presentation about the details of the

proposed amendments to the wildlife regs for us tonight. Following that, we do have two people who have pre-registered to offer live comment tonight, and we will then turn to that once Joe is done with his presentation.

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I would encourage everybody to check out DNREC's website. Under the "administrative law" section, you can find the public hearings pages. If you click on "public hearings," you can just go chronologically down the list of all the hearings that are currently up for the Department's consideration. This one is, I believe, the second to the top. They go in chronological order.

Everything that you're going to be seeing tonight, as well as those that have offered comment already, those comments are posted on that webpage. The presentation is posted on that webpage, and once we get the transcript from the court reporter, that will be put on the page as well. So there's a lot of information. You can look at it at your leisure, and I would encourage everybody to scan that out when you have a chance.

When I am setting the parameters, it's important to note that this is a formal legal hearing.

1 It is not a public workshop; it's not a public information session. It is a formal legal event. 3 purpose of tonight's hearing is not to advocate for or against these proposed amendments to these 4 regulations. It's not meant to advocate for anybody. 5 6 Rather, it's just to offer a platform where the 7 Department can show the presentation that you're about 8 to see, and also for those who want to offer comment 9 to do so live if they have pre-registered to do so.

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regarding this matter, whether they come in verbally tonight live at the hearing or whether they come in writing -- as I've said before, some have already offered comment and they're posted on the webpage. Or if they offer comment following tonight's hearing, they all bear the same weight. And they'll all be considered by Secretary Garvin prior to his making a determination in this matter.

In order to accommodate those who do wish to offer comment in writing following tonight's hearing, the record will not close at the conclusion of tonight's proceedings, but rather, it is going to remain open through January 12, 2024.

And again, while commenters that are

offering their comments live tonight are limited to three minutes verbally, there is no limit to the amount of comment that you can put in writing and offer to the Department should you wish to do so. So again, I would encourage you to do that if you wish.

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The following protocols apply to all DNREC public hearings. I'm going to run through them briefly.

Number one, all comment received must be limited to the subject matter at hand tonight, which, of course, are the proposed amendments to the Delaware wildlife regs. All comments pertinent to the subject matter of this hearing will be incorporated into the record and will be posted on the hearing webpage dedicated to this matter.

Number two, as I've mentioned previously, in order to accommodate everybody that may wish to offer comment, the record will remain open through January 12th, for those who wish to do so.

Number three, there is only one authentic record of this proceeding tonight, and it is the official court reporter's verbatim transcript.

Again, as soon as we receive that from the court reporter, it will be posted on the hearing page as

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Number four, the statutory purpose of the hearing tonight is to build the record with regard to these proposed amendments. The record, consisting of the transcript of the hearing tonight, all written comments, all exhibits, and eventually the hearing officer's report, will be reviewed by Secretary Garvin. The Secretary will ultimately issue an answer following that review process, and that order will contain his decision and his reasonings therefor.

Lastly, it's important to note that no decision has already been made about these regs or their proposed amendments, nor is any decision going to be made tonight. Again, we are here tonight to make sure that the public has an avenue to check out what this proposed amendment is -- or amendments are, rather, and also to receive comments to those who have pre-registered to do so.

That being said, I am going to turn the reins, so to speak, over to Joe Rogerson. He is with the Department's Division of Fish and Wildlife. And he has a presentation for you, quite detailed, actually, that's going to go down the line and talk about each one of these proposed amendments.

So, Joe, when you're ready, you can take it away.

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MR. ROGERSON: Good evening, Lisa. Can you hear me?

THE HEARING OFFICER: I can hear you.

MR. ROGERSON: Perfect.

Good evening, everyone. My name is Joe Rogerson. I'm a program manager with the Species Conservation and Research Program within the Delaware Division Fish and Wildlife. And I was asked to come tonight to present to you our proposed changes to our wildlife regulations, and I'm going to go through those.

So how do we get here? The proposed regulations were made available in the State Register on November 1st. They included information about providing public comments, which also opened at that point in time. So we've been receiving comments prior to the meeting tonight.

When the regulations were put in the register, we noticed a couple typos when they were transcribed. And so corrections were made to those on November the 3rd, and those are what have been available since then.

So as part of the process to amend regulations, the Department is conducting this public hearing, and so that we can review the proposed revisions. After tonight, as Lisa said, the public written comment period will remain open until January 12th.

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So I'm going to run through all of the sections within 3900 Wildlife of DNREC's

Administrative Code and highlight where we're making changes.

I'm not going to touch on the numerous grammatical formatting revisions and edits we've made. It's been quite some time since we've modified these regulations, and there's some new processes and organizational structure that they follow now. So there's numerous changes related to that. But I'm going to touch on the changes that were actually substantive to the process.

So the first one is, we're going to define "auxiliary markers" for the purposes of releasing game birds. We're going to create a definition of "direct supervision" for youth hunters: within 30 yards of direct line of sight while hunting. We will create a definition of "furbearers" to include

beavers, coyotes, red and gray fox, mink, muskrats, nutria, opossums, otters, raccoons, skunks, and weasels.

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We will define what "pen-raised released quail" are. We will clarify what a "baited field" is. An area will be considered baited for ten days after the removal of bait. We will add chukar partridge and Hungarian partridge to the list of liberated game species.

Within Section 2.0, we're proposing to add crossbows to the list of approved methods of take for hunting. Also within 2.0, we're proposing to allow .17 rimfire rifles and smaller muzzleloaders to the taking of raccoons and possums.

We propose to clarify both bullfrogs and green frogs can be harvested by hand. Clarify the type of ammunition approved for Sharp's rifles while deer hunting. We propose to clarify the types and features of foothold traps allowed, specifically as it relates to the jaw thickness of said traps.

We propose to clarify what rifles can be used for hunting squirrels: no pellet guns.

Requiring snapping turtle trappers to report their harvest at the end of the season.

Within Section 3.0, this is the federal laws and regulations adopted. We're proposing to rename the old squaw duck to long-tailed duck, as it's referred to now.

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We're also proposing to clarify that only youth hunters are allowed to hunt waterfowl during the special youth waterfowl seasons.

Previously, Delaware included non-ambulatory hunters using a wheelchair for mobility to participate in this season, but that was not allowed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Within 4.0, we're considering closing the diamondback terrapin season. We're considering allowing green frogs to be harvested with bullfrogs, and clarify that the daily bag limit for these species would be 24 in aggregate. Crow depredation requirements are now consistent with federal regulations; we're proposing to simplify those.

We're looking to extend the gray squirrel season one week later, which would now close the second Saturday in February. We're also looking to establish a chukar partridge season, which would coincide with the pheasant season dates.

Also within 4.0, seasons of the

regulations, we are proposing to close the wild bobwhite quail season. As such, though, we're considering allowing landowners with sufficient suitable habitat, a minimum of 40 acres, and implementing beneficial quail management practices, to apply for a wild bobwhite quail hunting permit, to promote quail management on their properties.

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Also related to quail, we're proposing to establish a pen-raised released quail season. The dates considered are the Monday before Thanksgiving through the second Saturday in February. And the Division will evaluate the wild bobwhite quail season closure every three years.

Also within 4.0, or seasons, there are some changes proposed related to trapping. We're considering adjusting the trapping season dates for raccoons and possums in Kent and Sussex Counties to coincide with the New Castle County season dates. This means they'll open two weeks earlier and close five days earlier.

We're also proposing to allow raccoon hunters to chase raccoons, no harvest, one month earlier, to now open on August 1st to allow additional training opportunities and reduce the number of

firearm deer seasons in which raccoon hunters are currently not allowed to hunt at night with the aid of a dog, and clarify the hunting hours for such. We're also looking to open the red fox season a month earlier to now open on November 1st, which is consistent when the red fox hunting season opens now.

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More proposed trapping season changes. We're looking to adjust the weather criteria used to justify a muskrat season extension to account for large snowfall events. February snowfall of 20 to 32 inches would extend the muskrat season one or two weeks, respectively.

We're also looking to establish trapping season dates for mink and otter to coincide with the current muskrat season dates. We also looked to eliminate the annual bag limit for beaver, an overabundant species here in the state.

Moving on to another section of our regulations, 5.0 is where you'll find the wild turkey regs. We want to clarify the possession of wild turkeys, that it would require a permit; establish criteria if turkeys escape captivity; and prohibit the taking of live wild turkeys or their eggs from the wild. Our hunter ed program asked us to clarify the

types of courses accepted for fulfillment of the turkey-specific hunter education requirements and include online courses.

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We're also considering to clarify the size of shot allowed for turkey hunting. We're considering nothing larger than 4 shot to promote technical advancement of shot shells and maintaining human safety considerations. Also proposing to clarify the prohibition of hunting turkeys using bait or dogs.

Few more things related to turkeys.

Eliminate the requirement to wear camouflage while turkey hunting. And currently, it's prohibited to wear the colors of red, white, and blue. We're to clarify that those would not pertain -- or that prohibition would pertain to external garments only.

We're also looking to formally establish the season dates for wild turkey hunting within our regulations, and establish a registration procedures for hunters to report their harvest via an automated registration system, similar to how our current deer registration is, once these regulations have been adopted and the system has been created.

7.0 is where you'll find our deer

regulations. One of the things we're proposing is to clarify that the harvest report card must be in a hunter's possession at all times when hunting deer.

And when a deer is not in the hunter's possession, a carcass tag with the deer registration number and harvest date must be affixed to the animal.

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Another proposed change is to remove the restriction of hunting game other than deer with the aid of dog during the firearms deer seasons. To minimize risk associated with chronic wasting disease occurring in Delaware, we're proposing to restrict the import of selected deer parts from high-fenced and captive facilities.

Also within 7.0, or deer seasons, we're proposing to simplify the firearm deer seasons by combining the either sex, antlerless, and special youth/disabled seasons as "shotgun seasons". By doing so, it will allow straight-walled pistol caliber rifles and handguns to be used during all seasons when it is legal to harvest deer with a shotgun.

We're also proposing to clarify that antlered deer may be harvested with archery equipment throughout the entire archery and crossbow seasons.

And then clarify that the archery and crossbow seasons

close on January 31st or the last day of the January muzzleloader season, whichever is later.

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More changes to the proposed deer seasons. We're proposing to restore the October antlerless deer season to only three days per week by eliminating the current Monday opening -- or Mondays that it's open, therefore providing a Friday-through-Sunday season to promote "opening day

We're also proposing to establish a special -- a second special shotgun season for youth and non-ambulatory hunters to occur the last Saturday and Sunday weekend in September.

effects" to help maximize harvest of antlerless deer.

In 8.0, you'll find our regulations governing lands and waters administered by the Division. We're proposing to clarify that motorized vehicles may only be on established and maintained roads, and prohibit speeding and reckless driving on these roads.

We're also proposing to prohibit the use of radio-controlled drones, boats, and other vehicles, or to launch model rockets on lands and waters administered by the Division without a permit from the Director.

We want to clarify that horses and bikes may only be used on roads and trails that have been designated by the Division. We're proposing to prohibit the use of metal detectors, on lands

administered by the Division, without a permit.

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More changes within 8.0: for the purposes other than hunting, trapping, or fishing, we're proposing to expand the hours of entry on lands administered by the Division to be a half hour before sunrise to a half hour after sunset, to promote additional wildlife watching opportunities.

We're proposing to restrict fishing on state wildlife areas to avoid conflicts with hunting seasons. It will be unlawful to fish from September 1st to January 31st and Monday to Saturday during the spring turkey season. Some ponds will remain open, those that are designated specifically for fishing opportunities. And these specific ponds will be indicated on wildlife area maps.

We want to clarify that shotguns and muzzleloaders with rifled barrels can be used for deer hunting on the Chesapeake and Delaware Canal. And clarify that all users of state wildlife areas must follow area map rules, not just those people that are

1 | hunting or trapping on these locations.

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More changes within 8.0: we're proposing to prohibit crabbing and fishing on any dike, water control structure, or within any impoundment found on lands administered by the Division.

We want to clarify that non-resident hunters are allowed to participate in deer drives conducted on lands administered by the Division where deer driving is permitted.

We want to prohibit the release of domestic or wild animals onto lands administered by the Agency unless they are lawfully permitted during dog training activities.

Moving on to Section 9.0, which is our wildlife theft prevention. We want to add and clarify various offenses for which informants may receive rewards through the Wildlife Theft Prevention Fund, if they provide tips that result in the arrest and conviction of the violator.

Within our nuisance wildlife regs, which is Section 10, we want to include rabbits in the list of wildlife that may be controlled without a permit, when causing damage within the limits of

residential or commercial areas of incorporated cities or towns, if the individual were using box or cage live traps.

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We also propose to clarify who needs a nuisance wildlife control operator permit, under which conditions a company needs to register for a permit, and under what conditions an individual needs to be trained and certified for these programs.

We will also -- are proposing to require nuisance wildlife control operators to abide by all conditions of the permit that's provided by the Agency once they've gone through their training program.

Section 14.0 is where you'll find information about falconry. We're proposing to extend the hunting season from the 28th of February to March 31st for falconers, and clarify the types of game species, specifically rabbits and squirrels and others, that may be taken by the aid of a falcon.

Section 15 is where you'll find the collection or sale of native wildlife. We want to clarify which species of wildlife may be possessed, bought, and sold, under which circumstances. Example, rabies vector species: coyotes, foxes, groundhogs,

possums, skunks, raccoons, may not be possessed due to concerns with rabies.

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We also need to update the common and scientific names of the list of reptiles and amphibians that could be possessed, similar to the long-tailed duck that I spoke about in the beginning of the presentation. There have been some changes out there since the regs were done last time.

about endangered species. We're proposing to add the saltmarsh sparrow to the state endangered species list based on numerous criteria that it meets under current conditions. And this species is forecasted to not likely persist beyond the year 2050.

We're proposing to add the carpenter frog to the state endangered species list based on multiple criteria that it meets, including only occurring at four known locations within the state.

And then we're also proposing to add the tri-colored bat to the state endangered species list. This species has been significantly impacted by white-nose syndrome, and is currently being proposed to be listed as a federal endangered species -- listed in the federal endangered species list.

Page 25

17.0 would be a section related to transferring harvested game, such that all transferred game and non-native/invasive wildlife must have a tag attached, signed by the hunter, stating their address; the total number of species harvested; and the date such animals were killed.

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However, the transfer procedures for harvested deer and turkey shall follow the requirements described by regulation of the Department in previous regulations, which states the registration number shall be indicated on the possession tag that is affixed to the animal.

19.0 will be a new section related to permits. We're proposing to establish a regulation prohibiting the violation of terms and conditions as outlined in permits that are issued the Division.

about game bird releases. We are proposing to require anyone releasing gamebirds into the wild to obtain a permit from the Division and provide the release location. All birds released must be properly marked according to Division criteria, as to identify them from wild birds.

21.0 is information about guide

licenses. We'd like to clarify when holders of a guide license are required to submit an annual report. What the proposed change would be, would make that to be July 1st of each year.

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We also would like to clarify the criteria for which a non-resident can be prevented from obtaining a guide license if they're guiding snow goose hunters, consistent with resident guides. For example, non-residents could not have been convicted of wildlife violations for the previous three years if they wanted to receive a non-resident guide license in Delaware, which is the same requirement we currently have for residents.

22.0 is information about our hunter and trapper license exempt number. We're proposing to clarify the rules for obtaining these numbers, including requiring a separate LEN number for each activity: one for hunting, one for trapping. If you're going to do both, you would get a number for each.

We're proposing to make it unlawful to obtain more than one hunting license or trapping LEN in the same license year. So you couldn't get two trapping LENs or hunting LENs. And we're proposing to

make it unlawful to obtain a LEN after purchasing a hunting or trapping license for the same activity. So you couldn't purchase a hunting license and then obtain another LEN.

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and invasive wildlife. We want to clarify the types of traps allowed to take coyotes, and extend the trapping season one month earlier to open November 1st instead of December 1st, which would be similar to the proposed changes for red fox.

We want to clarify that any nutria captured in the state are not to be released alive. And we'd like to change the phrase "feral swine" to "free-roaming swine," to reflect more accurately what most of these animals are, and restrict landowners from knowingly harboring free-roaming swine on their properties.

24.0 would be a brand-new section, proposed to be added to the regulations, titled Wildlife Management Zone Boundaries. We're proposing to define the boundaries of Delaware's 18 wildlife management zones based on the roads and the geographic features used to define those now.

As part of the website that Lisa talked

1 about in the beginning, for the public hearing and all the information related to this process, we have 11 3 exhibits presented that have been relevant to this entire process. And here is a list of those exhibits. 4 And with that, Lisa, I'm finished with 5 6 my component of the presentation now. 7 THE HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Thank you, 8 Joe, for all of that information. For record-keeping 9 purposes right now, to clarify, are the exhibits that 10 are on the screen now the same as those that have been 11 posted on the hearing page dedicated to this matter? Yes, they are. 12 MR. ROGERSON: 13 THE HEARING OFFICER: And have they 14 been changed or altered in any way since their 15 posting? 16 MR. THE HEARING OFFICER: He may not be

here. We can go back to him. I believe I saw the

other person, Ashley Kennedy, come in.

Ms. Kennedy, are you here? Can you

hear me?

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MS. KENNEDY: Yes. I am here. Can you hear and see me okay?

THE HEARING OFFICER: Your camera is turned off during the commenting, but you should see your name and a three-minute timer. It should begin as soon as you start speaking. So whenever you're ready, you can provide us with your comments.

MS. KENNEDY: Perfect. Well, thank you for the opportunity to speak. My name is Ashley Kennedy, and I am speaking on behalf of the Board of Delaware Audubon.

Delaware Audubon is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization and a statewide chapter of the National Audubon Society. Delaware Audubon is dedicated to developing a better appreciation of our natural environment and working for species and habitat conservation with a special focus on birds.

We applaud DNREC for taking on a

much-needed revision of outdated hunting regulations, and we appreciate proposed changes that would encourage hunters to use safer alternatives to lead shot. Toxicity from lead ammunition is responsible for millions of deaths annually in birds and other wildlife in the United States. That information is from the Cornell Wildlife Health Lab.

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We are heartened to see language under Section 5, wild turkeys, and specifically under 5.3, method of take, that allows smaller shot to be used. And we hope that this change will encourage use of Tungsten Super Shot, TSS, in lieu of lead shot.

However, the wording the of the proposed regulation change could be improved upon for clarity and safety. The current wording for 5.3.1 reads "It shall be unlawful for any person to use any firearm to hunt wild turkeys except a 10-, 12-, 16-, or 20-gauge shotgun loaded with shot no larger than size 4," without specifying what kind of shot may be used.

Because TSS has a higher density than lead shot, a smaller pellet can deliver the same amount of energy of much larger lead pellets. TSS provides a tighter pattern and improved penetration,

so Number 9 TSS is equivalent to Number 5 lead shot.

We believe that smaller shot sizes such as 7, 8, and

9, should only be legal if using TSS and should

certainly not be allowed with lead shot.

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In addition to the toxicity risk posed by lead ammunition, use of smaller lead pellets would likely result in more injured birds when a clean kill is not attained. We urge you to follow the example set by other states, such as Indiana and Maine, and revise the proposed text to specify that smaller shot sizes are only permitted with TSS.

Thank you very much for your time and consideration.

THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Ms.

Kennedy.

I'll ask right now, once again, if we can find Mr. Willis. I'm wondering if it might be a typo because Mr. Willis spoke at another hearing recently. And this may have just been a mis-click on his part, but certainly if he is in the audience, we can hear his comments now.

Do we see him at all?

MS. PERRY: Do not.

THE HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Yeah. I

would honestly be surprised because I know that Mr.

Willis is not a hunter. But anyway, let me go on and say some concluding remarks.

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Mr. Willis, if you do come in or if you are out there, you can certainly feel free to offer comment in writing as anyone else can, but we're just going to go ahead and move to close right now.

Again, when the court reporter gets the transcript to the Department, we will have it immediately posted on hearing webpage that's dedicated to this matter. The comment that Ms. Kennedy just gave, of course, will be included in the transcript.

And again, I would encourage anybody that wishes to make their considerations known for the record and for the Secretary's consideration, go ahead and offer your comment. It is unlimited, the amount of comment that you can put in writing to the Department.

Comments may be submitted through the comment form link on the hearing page, via email to dnrechearingcomments@delaware.gov, or via the old U.S. Postal Service at the physical address for DNREC that's indicated on the hearing page and all of the public notices that have been issued in this matter.
