RE: Hicks Park Soil Remediation

Dear Mr. Will,

The Delaware Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control (DNREC) is now requiring land remediation at Barbara Hicks Park in the Southbridge neighborhood of Wilmington because the "human health risk potentially posed by exposure to soils was determined to be unacceptable under residential and recreator exposure scenarios."

This public park was built on top of industrial fill that was left at the site between 1940 and 1965.

There is no specific remedial action in the Proposed Plan of Remedial Action. DNREC has considered possible remedial actions for the site, including "Placement of a one-foot soil, stone, or impervious cap/cover over impacted areas to restrict access to underlying soil, or excavation of soil with elevated concentrations of polyaromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs) or metals and disposal off-site."

Southbridge residents, as well as DNREC and the City of Wilmington, have voiced a clear preference for the specific remedial action of soil removal and the placement of soil and sod at the site. This measure would improve the use of the park by expanding greenspace and reduce the chance that children and adults are exposed to any remaining contaminants in soil at the park. This measure would also save the City of Wilmington time and money by not requiring the city to regularly inspect a potential cap at the site.

Additionally, because of the site's status as a public park in need of several structural upgrades beyond land remediation, it must be considered how proposed remedial actions will complement additional, upcoming park upgrades. Currently, the City of Wilmington is both considering additional park amenities to replace the recently removed tennis court while also attempting to address the significant drainage issues at the park that create an overwhelming mosquito presence in warm weather. In order to make the park's contamination remediation and overall upgrade as efficient as possible, these various construction activities must work in tandem to protect public health, encourage dynamic use of the park by all local residents, and create an innovative green space for the broader community.

## DNREC folks,

Here are my Department Comments as it reflects an extended public comment period for the email subject heading at Hicks Park.

We are working with the city on proposed improvements in front of Hicks Park, but not within the property area as you designate only the property area in your reports. The best I can illustrate for you is the attachment. I have yet to get my notice to proceed with engineering design to detail further, but we should be starting this overall project soon under the Transportation Alternatives Program.

Should you zoom in on the lower portion, the intention is to install two pedestrian style street lighting that will be (more than likely) within the existing right of way. A junction well which will probably be underground for the electrical conduits to power the lighting. We are also reconstructing the curb ramp and about 8 linear feet of 5' sidewalk at the corner of Bradford and B Street where sidewalk exists for ADA needs. So, there is some light excavation and placement of fixtures. As I read, the proposed remediation action is confined to the property itself and not the right of way area. As a side, note, the property across the street has an advertisement for townhomes.

We are wondering to what degree might this have an impact if the action and proposed measures are confided and specific to the tax parcels? Yes, we'd be glad to keep you in the loop with plan submissions and with our limits of construction for assurances.

Essentially precautions are nice, but under our TAP program, we are limited in funding and ensuring that we don't have do things we don't have to undertake.

Your thoughts towards this are greatly appreciated as this does also affect our design if notes or other standard haz mat provisions need to be added (if applicable). We'd like to get this out front rather than wait and then have to redesign or add something.
