MS. VEST: Tuesday, April 29, 2025.

And thank you, guys, for joining us this evening. Now that everyone is connected, we're going to go ahead and begin tonight's proceedings.

We are here tonight to provide the virtual platform for the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control to conduct its public hearing on the pending Coastal Zone Permit of Goodwill.

For those that may not know me, my name is Lisa Vest, and the DNREC secretary has designated me to be the hearing officer for tonight's proceeding.

Pursuant to DNREC standard public hearing protocols, this hearing is being conducted virtually.

While there are no signup sheets to document physical attendance tonight, the Zoom platform does generate a list of those who are virtually present for this evening's proceedings. So the Department still maintains a record of those who have joined tonight. And again, I thank you for taking your time to be here.

I have a few introductory remarks, and

then I'll be turning the floor over to both the

Department and then representatives for the applicant,
which in this case is Goodwill.

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Both the Department and the applicant have brief presentations that they are going to offer, not only for information for those of you that are in attendance, but also for the benefit of the hearing record, which is being compiled tonight.

At the conclusion of those proceedings, I'll then retake the floor and say a few concluding remarks to make sure people know how to offer comments should they wish to do so.

In the meantime, I do want to remind people that the Department does keep a hearing page online. It's under the Admin Law website section of the DNREC website in general. And all of the supporting documents, copies of both the Department's presentation and the applicant's presentation, as well as all the exhibits that'll be entered into the record tonight, they're all posted on that hearing page.

And anybody that wants to learn more about the project and actually read through the exhibits that are going to be entered tonight, you can go there and read them on your own time. There's a

lot of information there, and I would encourage anyone that is interested to do so.

We have a court reporter here tonight that will be preparing a verbatim transcript of tonight's proceedings. It usually takes a few days for that transcript to be prepared, but once we receive it from the court reporter, it will also be posted on the hearing page.

So, again, I would encourage anybody that's interested in this matter to give it a couple days for the transcript to get there, but by all means, check that out.

Before we go any further, it is important to set the parameters for tonight's hearing. First and foremost, this is a formal legal hearing. It is not a public information session nor any other informal type of workshop or town hall style event, nor is the purpose of tonight's proceeding to advocate for any side in any way.

Rather, the purpose of tonight's hearing is to build the record, as I've already mentioned. It provides the legal platform for the public to come and learn more about the project and to also find ways and make sure they know how to offer

comment should the same wish to be done.

Part of our standard protocol is that we allow folks to preregister with the Department should they wish to offer comment. In this particular case, no members of the public offered preregistration. So we're not going to have any live comment tonight.

But again, the record's going to remain open beyond tonight's hearing. Instead of the record closing at the conclusion of these proceedings, it's going to remain open through May 14th. So that gives people plenty of time, as I said, to go read up on it, look at the exhibits, look at the information that's on the hearing page.

And again, you can find that under the Admin Law tag on the DNREC website. And as long as the comment is received in writing on or before May 14th, it all bears the same weight as if it was offered live tonight, and it'll all be reviewed by the secretary prior to a formal decision being made in this matter.

I just have a couple more things to say, and then we'll get on with the presentations from both the Department and the applicant.

Number one, all comment received must be limited solely to the subject matter of tonight's hearing, which again is the pending Coastal Zone Permit of Goodwill.

Number two, in order to ensure that everyone who wishes to offer comment for the secretary's consideration is accommodated, the record in this matter, as I mentioned previously, is not going to close at the conclusion of the proceedings tonight, but it will remain open through May 14, 2025.

Number three, there is only one authentic record of this formal proceeding, and it is the official court reporter's transcript. And again, we will post that on the hearing page on DNREC's website as soon as it is received.

Number four, as I previously mentioned, the statutory purpose of tonight's hearing is to build the record with regard to this pending permit application.

The record, consisting of the transcript of tonight's hearing, any written comments that we may receive between now and May 14, all the exhibits that you'll hear mentioned tonight, and eventually the hearing officer's report, will all be

1 reviewed by Secretary Patterson.

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The secretary will ultimately make a decision regarding this permit application, and it will take -- it'll be in the form of a secretary's order. That order will contain his decision as well as his reasons therefore.

Lastly, it's important to note that absolutely no decision has been made by the Department with regard to this matter at this point, nor will any decision be made tonight as a result of these proceedings.

Again, the record remains open through May 14th so that the public can offer written comment if they wish to do so, and all that comment will be entered into the record and taken into consideration by the secretary prior to his decision being made.

That being said, I am going to turn the platform over to Eddy Meade. He has a brief presentation for the Department.

So, Eddy, when you're ready, you can begin.

MR. MEADE: All right. Good evening everyone. My name is Eddy Meade. I'm an environmental scientist in the Department of Natural

Resources and Environmental Control, with the Division of Climate, Coastal, and Energy.

The Coastal Zone Act regulates new and existing manufacturing, heavy industry, and bulk product transfer activities through a permitting system within the state's designated Coastal Zone, as defined by the Coastal Zone Act, which generally runs the length of the state along the Delaware River, Chesapeake and Delaware Canal, Delaware Bay, Inland Bays, and Atlantic Ocean.

The purpose of tonight's hearing is to review a Coastal Zone Act Standard Permit application submitted by Goodwill of Delaware and Delaware County, referred to as Goodwill, to manufacture recycled sand. The proposed operation is to take place within an existing building at 400 Centerpoint Boulevard, New Castle, Delaware.

This type of manufacturing within the defined Coastal Zone requires a Coastal -- a Standard Coastal Zone Act Permit.

Goodwill is proposing to produce sand using recycled glass and ceramics. This will be done by processing the glass and ceramics through a pulverizer. The maximum production of recycled sand

is expected to be 200 tons per year.

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Goodwill and DNREC Coastal Program

Section coordinated for several months over multiple application revisions to reach administrative completeness. This included coordination with other sections within the Department.

Over the course of these revisions,
Goodwill provided additional information, including
emission calculations and information regarding
emission reductions.

Goodwill submitted a final application on February 14, 2025. The Department deemed the application to be administratively complete on March 22, 2025.

The application was then noticed and made available in the News Journal; the Daily State News, which is formerly the Delaware State News; and the DNREC Public Notices website. Versions were made available in both English and Spanish on the DNREC Public Notices website, and the notices were posted in the New Castle and Route 9 public libraries.

A direct email was also sent out to subscribers on the Coastal Zone Act email list.

Additionally, the hearing was added to the Delaware

public meeting calendar on April 11, 2025.

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The production process of recycled sand was analyzed for potential environmental impacts. The primary source of potential pollution from the recycled sand would be particulate matter generated in the manufacturing process.

There are no proposed changes to wastewater or stormwater. The entire manufacturing process would be conducted in an existing building, so there are no changes to impervious surfaces. No hazardous waste permit is required to produce this sand.

This slide illustrates the standard production process as described in the application.

Particulate matter generated by producing the recycled sand would be mitigated using a misting system. This misting system decreases the total particulate matter emissions by 97 percent. Should the misting system be damaged or stop working, the production process would be halted until it is functional.

Brownfield Science & Technology, referred to as BSTI, was retained by Goodwill and provided an environmental impact statement which

analyzed the potential impacts of this particulate matter. Particulate matter calculations were determined using the EPA's AP-42 factor for stone crushing.

Based on this data, BSTI determined that the operation of the glass recycling facility, including generation of low levels of dust emissions, which will be confined to the facility interior, will not have negative environmental impacts on the Coastal Zone. Since there are no negative environmental impacts, no offsets would be required to produce the recycled sand.

We're here tonight to solicit public comment on the Goodwill CZA permit application. No decision on the permit application will be made tonight. The public comment period will be open through May 14, 2025. Secretary of DNREC will make a decision after the record has been closed and reviewed.

And then, finally, here is a list of the exhibits for the Department.

MS. VEST: Okay. Thank you, Eddy. And just a little housekeeping, as it were. Are the -- if you would go back to the list of exhibits for a hot

minute. Are the 11 exhibits that are identified on the slide that you're showing now the same as those that are posted on the hearing page?

MR. MEADE: Yes.

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MS. VEST: And have they been changed or altered in any way since that posting?

MR. MEADE: No.

MS. VEST: Excellent. Let the record reflect that DNREC Exhibits 1 through 11, as posted on the hearing page for this matter, as well as viewable now on the PowerPoint, are hereby entered into the formal hearing record.

(DNREC Exhibit 1 through Exhibit 11 were marked for identification.)

Does the Department have anything further that they wish to say at this time?

MR. MEADE: We do not.

MS. VEST: Excellent. Thank you. You can take that slide down now.

At this point I am going to turn the floor over to representatives from Goodwill. I believe that Fabiana is going to be making the presentation on behalf of Goodwill.

And, Fabiana, I have told the system to

1	allow you to screen share. So if you see the green
2	box with the arrow at the bottom of your screen, you
3	can go ahead and put up your presentation at this
4	time, and you can start when ready.

MS. O'TARO: Great. Thank you, Lisa. Give me one second while I do so. It does say "Host disabled participant screen sharing."

MS. VEST: It's being difficult tonight. Let's try this again. It did the same thing for the Department when I did it the first time.

MS. O'TARO: Okay. I think we are set.

MS. VEST: Excellent.

MS. O'TARO: Thank you.

MS. VEST: You can begin when ready.

MS. O'TARO: Great. Okay.

Thank you, everyone, for your --

MS. VEST: I can see your screen.

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MS. O'TARO: Okay. Wonderful.

Thank you, everyone, for your time.

I'm going to be telling a little bit about Goodwill and our mission, both our social mission and our

23 environmental mission, today.

First and foremost, Goodwill's mission

is to improve the quality of life for people with barriers to self-sufficiency through the power of work. Our vision is to empower people, strengthen families, build communities, and most recently added to our vision is to protect the planet.

Adding to that last vision of protecting the planet, you'll see here that we've integrated a more environmentally conscious strategy into our pillars -- and our pillars including our people, our businesses, our community, and our planet.

Speaking a little bit now to our social mission -- so we are a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization. And our -- we've been able to service over 15,000 services provided annually. Over 600 people were placed -- had jobs -- I'm so sorry. Over 600 people were assisted with job placement through our workforce development.

Some of these services include reentry programs, support services, disability services. In short, the folks that we help are folks with learning disabilities or physical disabilities, students coming right out of university, senior citizens reentering the workforce, and also folks that are -- have been recently incarcerated.

These are some of the areas that we serve, which include New Castle County, Kent County, Sussex County, and also some -- we have some retail stores in Delaware County, PA.

In 2024, we had an estimated 585,000 donors, which -- in 2024, we were able to divert over 24 million pounds of donations from the community, which also equates to 12,000 tons.

Speaking a little bit more to the items that we're able to divert from the landfill -- so as responsible stewards of the donated items and funds entrusted to us for the advancement of our nonprofit mission, and as protectors of our planet, Goodwill endeavors to make the most of every item we receive as we work towards our goal of zero waste.

Donations are prioritized for reuse through our retail stores, e-commerce, and outlet stores. And if donations are not salable or not purchased through these channels, we continue to maximize the life of these goods through reuse or recycling from our aftermarket partners.

These efforts contribute to our diversion of waste from landfill, and some of these items include toys, shoes, plastic film, cardboard,

textiles, and electronics.

We like to see ourselves as the solution to a more circular economy. In this visual here, you'll see that Goodwills participate in services of reuse, resell, donation. We make sure that materials that are generated in our economy get recycled, then sorted and processed. And this is all part of our donation stewardship.

So at Goodwill we strive to maximize the use of our donations. To do so, we follow a hierarchy of sustainable material management. So as I mentioned, reuse, recycle, downcycle -- and as a last resort, landfill. So taking these measures to handle materials with the environment and people in mind contributes to our participation in a more circular economy.

Not every donation material we receive can be recycled or reused if not purchased or salable. So this includes glass and ceramic donations, which may be chipped, broken, or have incomplete sets. Through a generous grant awarded by the Truist Charitable Fund, we have purchased a pulverizer that will turn glass and ceramic into sand, as Eddy mentioned.

And this picture over here is our ribbon cutting of our machine. Here's a picture of our location. In the top left is a picture of the outside of the recycling center, which also serves as our outlet in the front.

So we estimate an annual projection of 400,000 pounds of sand that we're able to convert from these glass and ceramic donations. And the pictures to the right show a more clear or glass-only sand product. And to the right is a picture of what our sand looks like when we incorporate ceramics and colored sand.

This list on the right are the different organizations that we've partnered with to ensure that we're meeting environmental and market standards for the sand product that we are producing, so making sure that we are doing tests to analyze metal and grain size.

And that's it. The picture on the left is a picture of Colleen Morrone, our CEO and president. And you can see our contact information on this slide as well.

MS. VEST: Excellent. Okay. Thank you, Fabiana.

For the record, let me just state that the applicant's PowerPoint presentation that you've just viewed has been provided to the Department, and it is formally entered into the record as Applicant's Exhibit 1.

(Applicant Exhibit 1 was marked for identification.)

And for those of you that want to, you can go back and study the PowerPoint, as you can the Department's PowerPoint. They'll both be placed on the hearing webpage. They should actually already be there, but by tomorrow morning they'll definitely be there.

So thank you, Fabiana. I appreciate that.

Normally, with our protocols, we do have the ability for members of the public to offer live comment if they wish to do so. The process is that there's a link on the hearing page, and they can sign up and offer comment that way. In this particular matter, we did not have any members of the public sign up to offer comment. So there will be no live comment received this evening.

However, as I mentioned, the hearing

record is not closing tonight at all. In fact, it remains open through close of business on May 14, 2025. So if there are any members of the public that wish to offer written comment for the secretary's consideration, you certainly may do so.

Eddy, if you could, real quick, could you go ahead and put up your final slide again because it provides the information on how people can offer comment?

MR. MEADE: Absolutely.

MS. VEST: You should still have

sharing abilities.

MR. MEADE: Just one second.

MS. VEST: Excellent. Thank you. Make

sure it goes up there a little bit bigger.

MR. MEADE: There we go.

As the slide says, comments can be received by the Department a couple different ways. You can submit comments by using the DNREC comment form. There's a little button -- it's a blue box, actually; it's not a button -- right on the hearing

If you'd wish to submit a comment, you

just click there, and it'll take you right to a form.

That comment will get sent directly to my Hearing

Comments inbox and -- easy peasy. It'll be a secure

way to get it straight to me.

You can also send it by good old United States Postal Service mail, as noted on the hearing page. But since we're talking now, and you're not probably looking at the hearing page, you can send it to my attention.

Again, my name is Lisa Vest. I am the hearing officer for this matter. And you can send it to DNREC, Attention: Office of the Secretary, with my name on it. And the address is 89 Kings Highway, K-I-N-G-S, Dover, Delaware, 19901.

Again, as the slide says, a copy of the court reporter's full verbatim transcript of everything that we've talked about tonight will be posted on the hearing page as soon as it gets received. Give it a few days, but as soon as we get it, we will make sure it gets posted.

I want to thank everybody for attending tonight. Again, comments are very much welcomed from the public. So feel free to do it. And any comment that's received bears the same weight.

So if it was said live tonight at the time of the hearing, or if it doesn't come in until right at the end of the day on May 14th, all comments bear the same weight, and they'll all be incorporated into the record, and the secretary will consider them prior to making the decision.

Again, I want to thank everybody for attending tonight. This hearing is hereby adjourned.
