P R O C E E D I N G S

THE HEARING OFFICER: Let's go ahead and start the proceedings tonight. I want to thank everybody who took the time out of their busy schedules to attend.

The date is Wednesday, October 22, 2025, and we are here this evening to provide the platform for DNREC to conduct its virtual public hearing regarding the department's proposed boating reg amendments.

For those of you that may not know me, my name is Lisa Vest, and the DNREC secretary has designated me to serve as hearing officer for tonight's proceedings.

I have a few introductory remarks, after which time I will be turning the floor over to department personnel. They have a very brief presentation that they wish to offer the public. It will be incorporated into the record that is being generated in this regulatory matter

FYI, the presentation will be posted in its entirety on the hearing webpage that's dedicated to this particular matter. There's a lot of information in that PowerPoint that talks about what

1 it is that the department is proposing to do, so I
2 would encourage the public to go check it out.

3 It is on the DNREC website under
4 "Admin. Law." And if you go under the "Admin. Law"
5 tab and scroll down to "Public Hearings," the boating
6 reg amendments matter is the very first one. So,
7 again, I would encourage the public to check that out.

8 We do have a court reporter here this
9 evening. They will prepare a verbatim transcript of
10 the hearing tonight, and, as always, that transcript
11 will also be posted on the hearing page. We'll get
12 that up there as soon as we receive it. And, again, I
13 would encourage everybody to read that for their
14 benefit.

15 Before we go any further, it's
16 important to set the parameters for tonight's
17 proceeding. Again, the purpose of this hearing is to
18 build the record to provide the formal legal platform
19 for the public to learn about the proposed boating reg
20 amendments and to gather comment if any are given to
21 us by the public in this matter.

22 The community concerns regarding all of
23 our regulatory matters are extremely important to
24 DNREC, and that's one of the main reasons why we hold

1 these hearings so that the public can be advised of
2 these proposed actions that the department wishes to
3 take and to provide a platform where the public can
4 submit their comments if they wish to do so.

5 I should also note that whether the
6 comments came in prior to tonight or whether they come
7 in following tonight's proceedings, all comment bears
8 the same weight. And as long as it is related to the
9 subject matter of tonight's hearing, they all will be
10 incorporated into the record, and the comments will
11 also be posted on the hearing page. So all things
12 concerning this proposed matter can be found on the
13 hearing page.

14 I do want to go through a couple
15 protocols, and after that, I will turn the floor over
16 to the department personnel.

17 Number one, all comment received must
18 be limited solely to the subject matter of tonight's
19 hearing. Again, all comments that we receive
20 concerning this matter will be incorporated into the
21 formal record and posted on the hearing page dedicated
22 to this matter.

23 Number two, in order to ensure that
24 everyone who wishes to offer comment for the

1 secretary's consideration is accommodated, the record
2 is not going to close at the conclusion of tonight's
3 proceedings.

4 Instead, the record will remain open
5 for an additional 15 days following the hearing
6 tonight, and members of the public can feel free to
7 submit any kind of comments that they want regarding
8 this matter all the way up through November 6th.

9 And, again, whether it would come in
10 tonight, whether it came in before tonight, or if it
11 comes in on the afternoon of November 6th, it all
12 bears the same weight.

13 Number three, there is only one
14 authentic record of this proceeding, and it will be
15 the official court reporter's transcript. And, again,
16 that'll be posted on the webpage as soon as we receive
17 it.

18 Number four, the statutory purpose of
19 the hearing tonight is to build the record with regard
20 to this matter. The formal record, which consists of
21 the transcript of this hearing, any and all written
22 comments which the department may receive between now
23 and November 6th, all exhibits that the department
24 enters into the record this evening, and eventually a

1 report summarizing all of those things will be
2 gathered and reviewed by Secretary Patterson, and he
3 will use that to form his decision regarding this
4 regulatory matter.

5 And lastly, it is important to note
6 that no decision has already been made concerning this
7 proposed promulgation, nor will any decision be made
8 tonight. Again, we are here just to say this is the
9 platform.

10 You're going to hear a lot about what
11 these proposed amendments are and, again, reminders
12 throughout the proceeding tonight that all of this
13 information that you'll see tonight will be available
14 to view on the hearing page dedicated to this matter.

15 That being said, I am going to now turn
16 the floor over to department staff for their brief
17 presentation.

18 So, Drew, you can take it away.

19 MR. AYDELOTTE: Great. All right.

20 Thank you.

21 First of all, thank you, everyone. My
22 name is Drew Aydelotte, and I'm a major with Delaware
23 Natural Resources Police, Fish and Wildlife Unit. And
24 before I get started, I just want to take a moment and

1 especially thank a few people, a few -- few members of
2 my staff.

3 First and foremost, captain Joshua
4 Hudson. He oversees our boating education office and
5 has done an exceptional job of contributing to these
6 proposed amendments.

7 Also, our senior office manager, Randy
8 Besecker [ph], just a catch-all as far as helping out
9 with the boating education program and then also
10 helping out overall with our law -- law enforcement
11 program.

12 And finally, I'd like to -- I'd like to
13 especially thank our program license coordinator, Dawn
14 Coburn, who oversees our boat registration office and
15 commercial licensing for her contributions to these
16 proposals.

17 I also want to take a moment and thank
18 Lisa Vest, our hearing officer tonight, as well as
19 Michelle Jacobs and Mike Mahaffey [ph] for all their
20 support. Thank you.

21 My contact and resource information are
22 listed on the PowerPoint, and I will show this at the
23 end of my PowerPoint also.

24 So our agenda tonight. First is a

1 welcome and introduction, which I provided. Next is
2 our purpose of the proposed amendments. Next, I'll
3 speak to the background and provide our statutory
4 authority for the regulatory development part of this.

5 We'll go over a review of the proposed
6 amendments. I'll speak to the key impacts we
7 anticipate with these changes. And I'll go over where
8 we're currently at in the regulatory process.

9 The purpose of the amendments. First
10 and foremost, we -- we're trying to align our
11 regulations with the updated federal requirements.
12 We're here also here to clarify definitions and reduce
13 ambiguity for -- for regulated parties.

14 We're here to modernize our procedures
15 to reflect current best practices. And with these
16 amendments, we want to enhance public health, safety,
17 quality outcomes. And finally, we want to streamline
18 compliance and reduce the overall administrative
19 burden to our staff.

20 The background and statutory authority.
21 The current regulation that's being proposed for
22 amendment is Title 7, Delaware Administrative Code
23 3100. And this was last amended in April of 1999, so,
24 yes, this is over two decades old before we've had any

1 changes.

2 The governing statutory authority that
3 we've used for this regulatory process can be -- is --
4 is found under Title 23 of Delaware Code,
5 Section 2114. The reference material for the federal
6 side of things that we used was 33 CFR and
7 46 U.S. Code.

8 Mandates. The mandates for review and
9 amendments. On February 10th of this year, the United
10 States Coast Guard Boating Safety Division completed a
11 program review of Delaware State Recreational Boating
12 Safety Program. This review is used to help monitor
13 if a state follows specific elements of applicable
14 federal law and regulations, including what I just
15 spoke to, Title 46 USC and 33 CFR.

16 Deficiencies at that time were noted in
17 the state regulation elements of the Delaware State
18 RBS Program, Recreational Boating Safety Program, and
19 required us to -- to conduct corrective actions. So a
20 large majority of our amendments to the boating
21 regulations are based on a response to those
22 deficiencies.

23 Before I dive into the proposed
24 amendments, I wanted to make the public aware that

1 there's a substantial amount of formatting and style
2 adjustments that were made throughout the regulation.
3 These changes are not substantive and do not change
4 the intent of the various regulations.

5 There was a lot of indentations, a lot
6 of numbering changes, a lot of capitalizations, and so
7 forth. So I just wanted to make sure the public was
8 aware of those changes.

9 THE HEARING OFFICER: Drew, I'm sorry.
10 I'm going to interrupt you. Do you realize that your
11 PowerPoint is not forwarding?

12 MR. AYDELOTTE: It's not forwarding?

13 THE HEARING OFFICER: No. At least on
14 my side, it's still stuck on the public hearing page,
15 the very first one.

16 MR. AYDELOTTE: It's showing Slide 6
17 for me.

18 THE HEARING OFFICER: Okay.

19 MR. LOOK: I'm not seeing it forwarding
20 either.

21 MR. AYDELOTTE: Okay. You want me to
22 stop sharing and try to reshare it?

23 THE HEARING OFFICER: Yeah. Sorry to
24 do that. I'm not trying to break your rhythm or

1 anything.

2 MR. AYDELOTTE: That's all right. No.
3 I was thinking it was working. Stand by.

4 THE HEARING OFFICER: It just may be a
5 little glitch.

6 MR. AYDELOTTE: Okay.

7 THE HEARING OFFICER: Worst case
8 scenario, the whole thing is going to be posted on the
9 hearing page, so if we can't get it to forward, people
10 can look at it at their leisure.

11 MR. AYDELOTTE: All right. Stand by.

12 THE HEARING OFFICER: Okay. You're
13 back up.

14 MR. AYDELOTTE: Okay.

15 THE HEARING OFFICER: See if it'll
16 forward for you.

17 MR. AYDELOTTE: Stand by.

18 MR. LOOK: I think since you're showing
19 the original PowerPoint page, when you hit the -- the
20 "Slideshow Present," it doesn't go to the
21 presentation. I think that's what might be happening.

22 MR. AYDELOTTE: Okay. Still not
23 showing?

24 THE HEARING OFFICER: You're still on

1 the first page. Can you just physically click on each
2 slide?

3 MR. AYDELOTTE: Yeah. I'm -- I'm
4 clicking on it, and I can change each slide from my
5 side of things.

6 MR. LOOK: Could you perhaps, like,
7 click in the program so it's not, like, the full
8 screen? But we'd be able to, like, see which slide
9 that you're on if we can't get the presentation
10 working.

11 MR. AYDELOTTE: I can try. Did that
12 work?

13 THE HEARING OFFICER: There we go.
14 We're now seeing detailed changes by section.

15 MR. AYDELOTTE: Okay. Is it changing?

16 THE HEARING OFFICER: Yes.

17 MR. AYDELOTTE: Okay.

18 THE HEARING OFFICER: So whatever you
19 did, just keep doing that.

20 MR. AYDELOTTE: Okay. Always a glitch.
21 All right. Sorry about that.

22 THE HEARING OFFICER: It's all good.

23 MR. AYDELOTTE: All right. So this is
24 where I left off. I was speaking to the grammar and

1 style and formatting changes that you'll find
2 throughout this regulation.

3 Again, we last amended these
4 regulations over two decades ago, so a lot has changed
5 as far as the formatting and style, a lot of
6 indentations, capitalizations, numbering that are
7 throughout the entire document. So I just wanted the
8 public -- to make sure the public was aware of that
9 going into this.

10 Okay. Now I want to go into detail the
11 changes that are for each of the sections that are
12 applicable to this.

13 So the very first section I want to
14 speak to is section 1.0, which is the general --
15 it's -- it's titled "General." So this section
16 updates terminology, and this is done, again,
17 throughout the -- the regulation itself.

18 So the term "natural resources police
19 officer" replaces "enforcement officer." This is done
20 to ensure consistency with our official title for the
21 department's law enforcement personnel, and this
22 clarifies our jurisdiction and reinforces the
23 authority of the natural resources police and the
24 enforcement and compliance actions related to these

1 regulations.

2 2.0 dives into a definitions section.
3 And this -- this section underwent a substantial
4 amount of modernization to match federal language
5 based on 33 CFR and 46 USC updates.

6 New terms were added, which included
7 the "engine cut-off switch." We commonly call it
8 "ECOS." It's a safety device that stops the engine if
9 the operator's ejected, and I'll speak to this a
10 little bit further down in our later sections.

11 We also added a definition for "ECOS
12 Link," which is the engine cut-off switch link. This
13 is a physical or wireless connection between the
14 operator and switch.

15 We also added or changed -- or I should
16 say updated the terms for "wearable PFD" and "throw
17 PFD," and this just replaces the outdated typings for
18 the manufacturer codes for life jackets.

19 Several definitions were also
20 clarified. "State of principle operation" and the
21 term "vessel" were all updated to align Delaware's
22 terminology with national registration standards.

23 Overall, these changes bring Delaware's
24 definitions into compliance with modern federal

1 terminology and boating safety standards.

2 Section 3.0 is primarily dealing with
3 our vessel registration and numbering, and this
4 section modernizes and expands vessel registration
5 requirements and data collection. So what we did here
6 was add new fields in the certificate of number, which
7 we commonly call the "CON."

8 And this is in the application itself,
9 including vessel use, which we're talking about
10 commercial, charter, and fishing. We also went into
11 the hull material covering rubber, vinyl, and canvas,
12 and propulsion types, drive types, and fuel types.
13 These were all modernized to incorporate federal
14 definitions as well.

15 We also updated the descriptions for
16 vessel types, so this is what I'm speaking to is
17 airboats, houseboats, inflatable boats. These were
18 all added to the application process's proposals.

19 We also proposed to remove the
20 requirement to list the social security number as a
21 requirement on the application. Owners under the
22 proposal would only now provide a tax -- tax ID
23 number, a date of birth with driver's license, or some
24 other unique identifiers such as a passport.

1 The certificate, or your registration
2 that you carry on a vessel, was also updated to allow
3 for not only a hard copy, but also a proposed digital
4 version. And if the hard copy was still being
5 carried, there's also a change in the size of the card
6 to being a pocket-size requirement. This is all a
7 proposal.

8 These updates to the numbering and
9 display ensure consistency with the United States
10 Coast Guard's numbering system. These changes improve
11 our data accuracy, engage -- or enhance our digital
12 accessibility, and align Delaware's registration
13 processes with federal standards.

14 Section 4.0 is our casualty reporting
15 section. This section significantly strengthens
16 accident and casualty reporting requirements. So the
17 reporting damage threshold was proposed increased from
18 five hundred to two thousand dollars which is
19 consistent with federal reporting requirements.

20 We also added a proposal for an
21 immediate notification to law enforcement when a
22 vessel causes property damage and the property owner
23 cannot be immediately located. Together, these
24 changes ensure quicker response times, improve data

1 accuracy for accident statistics, and enhance overall
2 public safety on Delaware waterways.

3 Section 5.0. This is water skiing.
4 Updates -- our proposal is to update the list of
5 prohibited skiing areas -- water skiing areas to
6 reflect current safety and navigational priorities.

7 The Chesapeake and Delaware Canal,
8 commonly known as a "C&D," has been added to the
9 restricted list joining existing no-ski zones such as
10 Rehoboth Lewes Canal and the Indian River Inlet.

11 These updates were based on increased
12 vessel traffic, confined waterways, and safety
13 concerns. Overall intent with this proposed change is
14 to reduce collisions, reduce property damage, and --
15 and injury in high-traffic waterways.

16 6.0 deals with our vessel speeds. Here
17 we proposed introduction of a new slow, no-wake
18 requirement when, within 100 feet of any law
19 enforcement or emergency vessel displaying activated
20 lights, red and blue lights, or fire companies with
21 blue lights.

22 This reinforces operators must maintain
23 a safe and controllable speed at all times based on
24 the conditions, vessel traffic, and visibility. This

1 amendment improves the safety of our first responders
2 during rescue and enforcement operations and reduces
3 potential wake-related damage or accidents.

4 9.0 is our minimum required equipment
5 for vessels. This is one of the most extensive
6 updates to our regulation -- our proposed regulations,
7 and we were looking to modernize the safety equipment
8 standards to align, again, with United States Coast
9 Guard requirements.

10 The first proposal was for fire
11 extinguishers. We proposed updating the label
12 terminology from the old typing codes such as the B-1,
13 Type B-2, and so forth, with the new manufacturer's
14 terms of 5-B, 20-B, or 160-B.

15 We added -- the proposals are for
16 adding details on acceptable maintenance conditions,
17 pressure gauge requirements, and replacements of
18 obsolete units.

19 Personal flotation devices, or PFDs,
20 again, as I spoke to in the definitions section, we're
21 proposing replacing the typing codes for personal
22 flotation devices and adding in more simplified terms
23 recognized by the U.S. Coast Guard and manufacturers,
24 those terms being "wearable," meaning worn on the

1 body; and "throwable," being thrown to a person in the
2 water. This replaces our typing like Type 1, Type 2,
3 Type 3, and Type 4.

4 9.4 is our ECOS, or engine cut-off
5 switch requirement. The proposal establishes a new
6 rule making -- new rule mandating the use of engine
7 cut-off switch lengths for all vessels under 26 feet
8 capable of developing 115 pounds of thrust or
9 3 horsepower while on plane or reaching above a slow,
10 no-wake speed.

11 There are exceptions provided or
12 proposed for enclosed-helm vessels and older vessels
13 not originally equipped with an ECOS.

14 At this time and for the record, I
15 wanted to note a correction to 9.4 that we intend to
16 adjust before final regulations are published, and it
17 specifically focuses on the exemption.

18 And it reads in 9.4, "This regulation
19 may not apply if the main helm of the vessel is
20 installed," and it should read, "within an enclosed
21 cabin." So we'll be striking "with," adding "within,"
22 striking the word "and," and adding the word "an."

23 These updates address modern vessel
24 terminology, improve enforcement consistency, and

1 promote accident prevention through better equipment
2 standards.

3 Section 10.0 will be the last section I
4 speak to tonight, and that's on the boat ramps and
5 parking lot areas of division-owned property.

6 This section, the proposal is adding
7 clarity to parking regulations for division-owned
8 properties. It expands the list of items that cannot
9 be left unintended for more than 48 hours without
10 prior authorization from the natural resources police.
11 This is including vessels along with trailers and
12 vehicles.

13 This amendment helps prevent
14 congestion, abandoned equipment, and misuse of limited
15 parking resources at state owned boating facilities.

16 Okay. Now I just want to summarize the
17 key impacts that we anticipate if these proposals are
18 finalized. These amendments, again, modernize
19 Delaware's boating regulations for the first time in
20 over two decades.

21 They strengthen safety requirements for
22 recreational and commercial boaters. They simplify
23 and modernize registration processes and record
24 keeping, improve alignment with Coast Guard standards,

1 ensuring reciprocity across state lines, and finally,
2 they enhance law enforcement capabilities through
3 clearer authority and updated reporting thresholds.

4 The outcome is a safer, more efficient,
5 and more user-friendly regulatory framework that
6 supports both the boating community and our first
7 responders.

8 I'll just give a brief overview of our
9 regulatory process to date. First -- first action,
10 the Start Action Notice underwent a division
11 director's review and received the secretary's
12 signature.

13 The deputy attorney general from the
14 environmental unit and the civil division of the
15 department of justice conducted a legal review of the
16 draft regulations. The department deputy secretary
17 reviewed and approved the draft regulations.

18 Legal notice advertising. The public
19 hearing was made available on the DNREC website, the
20 public meeting calendar, and published in both the
21 Wilmington News Journal and the Daily State News.

22 The proposed regulations, the
23 register's notice, and the regulatory flexibility
24 analysis and impact statement were published in the

1 Register of Regulations. And tonight, we're holding a
2 public hearing in reference to the proposed regulation
3 changes.

4 I have attached -- I have included on
5 PowerPoint nine exhibits that will be made available
6 for the public through the public hearing website that
7 I'll provide another link to on my final slide.

8 (Exhibits 1 through 9 were marked for
9 identification.)

10 MR. AYDELOTTE: Again, this is my
11 contact information, my email, my phone number. As
12 the hearing officer indicated, any comments made
13 directly to me should not be made directly to me if
14 they're -- if they want it on the public record. To
15 access the documents, I've included the website below.

16 And that concludes my presentation.

17 THE HEARING OFFICER: Great. Thank you
18 so much, Drew. Just a little housekeeping for the
19 benefit of the record. The slide that showed the nine
20 exhibits that the department is proposing to enter
21 into the record, are they the same nine exhibits that
22 were posted on the hearing page?

23 MR. AYDELOTTE: Yes, ma'am, they are.

24 THE HEARING OFFICER: And have they

1 been changed or altered in any way?

2 MR. AYDELOTTE: No, they have not.

3 THE HEARING OFFICER: Excellent. Let
4 the record reflect that Exhibits 1 through 9 as
5 identified both in the PowerPoint slide just presented
6 as well as on the hearing page dedicated to this
7 promulgation are hereby incorporated into the formal
8 hearing record.

9 (Exhibits 1 through 9 were received
10 into evidence.)

11 THE HEARING OFFICER: Drew, does the
12 department have anything further they wish to add at
13 this time?

14 MR. AYDELOTTE: Not at this time. No.

15 THE HEARING OFFICER: Excellent. Thank
16 you very much for your presentation.

17 Normally, at this point in the hearing,
18 we would turn the floor over to any members of the
19 public that had pre-registered to offer comment. In
20 this particular matter, we did not have any members of
21 the public pre-register. So that being said, we are
22 going to move towards concluding this matter.

23 As I mentioned previously, the record
24 is not going to close at the conclusion of tonight's

1 proceedings. Rather, pursuant to Delaware law, the
2 matter is going to remain open for an additional 15
3 days exclusively for the purpose of accepting public
4 comment should any be submitted. So there's that.

5 I do want to highlight the fact that
6 comments can be submitted through a comment form link
7 on the hearing page via direct email to
8 dnrechearingcomments@delaware.gov or via the snail
9 mail, United States Postal Service, at the physical
10 address for DNREC, which is also listed on the hearing
11 page.

12 I should also note that written
13 comments to DNREC may not be submitted using typical
14 social media platforms such as Twitter, Facebook,
15 YouTube, or standardized text messaging.

16 Again, remember that all comment,
17 regardless of how it is received, as long as it is
18 received by the department on or before November 6th,
19 all the comment bears the same weight, and all will be
20 incorporated into the hearing record and posted on the
21 hearing page so that everybody can see what
22 everybody's talking about.

23 Again, we present these public hearings
24 as a mechanism to not only inform the public of

1 pending actions that are currently happening at DNREC,
2 but again to also provide a platform for comments
3 should the public indicate that they wish to do so.

4 As I said previously, I want to thank
5 everybody for taking the time to attend tonight's
6 hearing. This matter is formally adjourned.
