My name is Grier Stayton. I have a farm in Kent and one in Sussex County, comprising 300 acres - of which 100 acres are woodlands. My primary crops are corn, soybeans, and hay. These crops are significantly damaged every year by deer, in spite of my efforts which I will summarize below. Since coyotes are known to be a predator of deer - especially young or injured - I strongly oppose the proposed rule to allow year-round hunting. My efforts to reduce deer damage are summarized as follows: the lease of hunting rights and the use of DNREC Deer Damage Permits (thank you); the planting of feeding buffers around the woods (including plant species conducive to wildlife and pollinators); the use of deterrent sprays on the crops (sheep fat was used this year, applied by drone, was effective for about 2 weeks, but was very expensive); and, the planting of forage soybeans (a good "trap" crop that the deer seem to prefer over the grain crops). These measures are important in helping to deter some damage but I still lost about 1/2 of my first cutting of alfalfa to deer, and the soybeans were hit hard until I sprayed the sheep fat deterrent. DNREC and deer hunters are due a lot of credit for their harvest efforts and I encourage that to continue. However, even with the good harvest numbers and the good ratio of does to bucks taken, I have not seen any measurable drop in the population. 20-30 deer in my crops at night is not uncommon. It's unfortunate and ill-advised that DNREC is proposing the removal of what I consider a "bonus" deer control measure, i.e. coyotes. I have seen coyotes on my farm and can honestly report no problems with livestock or pets being harmed. My wife's farm in Prime Hook has had a coyote presence for maybe 5 years or more and, again, no harm to pets or livestock. Why there is this general opinion that covotes are bad baffles me. When wolves were reintroduced into Yellowstone the "balance of nature" was restored. Why wouldn't the same occur here in Delaware with coyotes? Year-round hunting of coyotes should not be allowed. Of greater concern is the white tail deer population. Thank you for the opportunity to comment.
