P R O C E E D I N G S

MS. VEST: It is 6 p.m. I think that everybody's connection is secured, so we are going to go ahead and start tonight's proceedings. I want to thank everybody for taking the time out of their busy schedules to join us tonight.

The date is Wednesday, August 27, 2025, and we are here this evening to provide the formal platform for DNREC to conduct its virtual public hearing and gather comment regarding the Department's proposed wildlife regulation amendments. For those of you who may be tuned in that do not recognize me, my name is Lisa Vest, and Cabinet Secretary Patterson has appointed me to serve as the hearing officer for tonight's proceedings.

Before we begin tonight, I just want to do a couple little things here. First, I'd like to make sure that everyone is aware that the Zoom platform that we are using tonight has the ability for closed captioning in multiple languages.

If you're interested in that, to start your closed captioning, if you're on a computer or a laptop, at the bottom of your screen, you should see a "Show Captions" button. If you don't see that, you

1 may have to look for the little ellipse that has three  
2 dots that say "More." It depends if you're on a Mac  
3 or a Windows-based computer.

4 But once you find the "Show Captions"  
5 button, you should click that caret pointing up.  
6 It'll bring up various translation options. You can  
7 select your preferred language from there. If your  
8 preferred language is not listed, you can select  
9 "More," and all of the languages come up.

10 We use Zoom in particular because  
11 there's over 20 languages available, so we just like  
12 to make sure that if that's a comfort spot for you, by  
13 all means, you can feel free to utilize that. Same  
14 thing if you're calling in from a smartphone. At the  
15 bottom of your screen, there should be a button that  
16 you can select captions or it may just say "CC" in  
17 caps.

18 If your preferred language isn't listed  
19 at the bottom, again, you may have to look for the  
20 little three dots that say "More." You should then  
21 select the meeting settings, and then once you select  
22 your settings, go to "Translation Language," and that  
23 should bring up all of the languages that you need and  
24 it -- hopefully you can get to where you need to be

1 from there. So I just wanted to bring that up for  
2 anybody that that may be of interest or assistance  
3 for.

4 At the conclusion of my introductory  
5 remarks, I will be turning the floor over to Joe  
6 Rogerson. He is with the Department's Division of  
7 Fish and Wildlife. Joe's going to have a brief  
8 presentation concerning the Department's proposed  
9 amendments.

10 We do this for both the benefit of the  
11 hearing record being generated in this matter and also  
12 to provide some better understanding for members of  
13 the public that may join us tonight. Once we get done  
14 with tonight's proceedings, everything that you see  
15 tonight will be posted on the hearing page that's  
16 dedicated to this matter.

17 If you go onto DNREC's website, look  
18 for the "Administrative Law" tab, and under that is  
19 "Public Hearings," and it'll be right close to the top  
20 because all of our hearings are listed in  
21 chronological order. And I would encourage members of  
22 the public to check that out. There's a lot of  
23 information available on that hearing page, and,  
24 again, just check it out if you'd like to.

1           We have a court reporter here with us  
2       this evening that will prepare a verbatim transcript  
3       of the hearing. DNREC has a statutory obligation to  
4       do that. And once we get that transcript, it too will  
5       go on the hearing page dedicated to this matter. So  
6       you'll be able to see the presentation, review it at  
7       your leisure, blow it up a little bit.

8           Because I know sometimes, depending on  
9       what computer you're on, it may -- the print may be a  
10      little small. So you can go back and read it, enlarge  
11      it if you'd like to, look at the exhibits, read the  
12      transcript, and you can get a lot of information from  
13      reviewing that hearing page.

14          As I mentioned, the purpose of the  
15      hearing tonight is to gather comment for those members  
16      of the public that wish to do so as well as provide  
17      additional information. As always, the public  
18      concerns regarding DNREC's actions are very important  
19      to the Department.

20          Those concerns are incorporated into  
21      each hearing record by the public submitting their  
22      comments directly to DNREC, either in writing or live  
23      at hearings, such as the one we're doing tonight.  
24      While all the public comments are greatly appreciated,

1 each comment must be limited solely to the subject  
2 matter of each hearing, which in this particular  
3 instance, once again, are the proposed regulatory  
4 amendments to wildlife.

5 I should also note that all comment  
6 that is submitted to DNREC, whether it comes in  
7 verbally or whether it is in writing, received either  
8 before or after tonight's hearing, it all bears the  
9 same weight, and it'll all be considered equally by  
10 Secretary Patterson prior to his making a decision in  
11 this matter.

12 We do have two members of the public  
13 that have pre-registered to speak live tonight.  
14 DNREC's process is that we have a pre-registration  
15 page also connected to the hearing page, and members  
16 of the public have the opportunity to pre-register to  
17 be recognized at the hearing. As I mentioned, we have  
18 two tonight. Following Mr. Rogerson's presentation,  
19 we will turn the floor over to them.

20 Each speaker will have a total of three  
21 minutes each to offer their comment. If, for any  
22 reason, all the comment is not able to be given in  
23 three minutes, by all means, everyone is encouraged to  
24 supplement their comments in writing. And for that

1 particular purpose, the record is not going to close  
2 at the conclusion of tonight's hearing.

3           Rather, it's going to remain open, and  
4 as long as comment is received up through September  
5 12th, it'll be considered equal just as if it was here  
6 tonight, and it will be posted on the hearing page and  
7 incorporated into the record. Once again, the  
8 presentation that you'll be listening to tonight along  
9 with all of the other documentation is on the hearing  
10 page, and I would, again, encourage you to check that  
11 out.

12           Briefly, the following protocols apply  
13 to all DNREC hearings. I'm just going to list them  
14 briefly. Number one, all comment received must be  
15 limited solely to the subject matter of tonight's  
16 hearing, which, again, are the proposed regulatory  
17 amendments to wildlife. All comments pertinent to  
18 that subject matter will be incorporated into the  
19 record and posted on the hearing page as I've  
20 previously mentioned.

21           Number two, in order to ensure that  
22 everyone who wishes to offer comment is accommodated,  
23 the record will remain open following tonight's  
24 proceedings through September 12, 2025.

1                   Number three, there is only one  
2                   authentic record of this matter, and it will be the  
3                   official court reporter's transcript, which, again,  
4                   we'll get that posted online as soon as it gets  
5                   received.

6                   Number four, the statutory purpose of  
7                   tonight's hearing is to build the record, the record  
8                   consisting of the transcript of this hearing, all  
9                   written comments, all exhibits, and eventually, a  
10                  report summarizing the entire action will all be  
11                  gathered and reviewed by Secretary Patterson prior to  
12                  any decision being made in this matter.

13                  And, lastly, it's important to note  
14                  that no decision has been made with regard to this  
15                  proposed action at this time, nor will any decision be  
16                  made tonight. Again, we are here to fully vet this  
17                  matter to the public to make sure that a platform is  
18                  provided should people wish to offer comment and make  
19                  sure they know how to offer comment if they wish to do  
20                  so between now and September 12th.

21                  That being said, I am going to turn the  
22                  matter over to Department personnel for their brief  
23                  presentation.

24                  So, Joe, when you're ready, you may

1 begin.

2 MR. ROGERSON: Thank you, Lisa. Can  
3 you hear me?

4 MS. VEST: I can hear you fine.

5 MR. ROGERSON: Good.

6 Thank you, everyone. My name is Joe  
7 Rogerson. I'm the Wildlife Section Administrator with  
8 the Delaware Division of Fish and Wildlife. Before I  
9 get started, I want to thank you, Lisa; Michelle  
10 Jacobs; Mike Mahaffie; and especially Rob Hossler for  
11 helping us get to this point during the regulatory  
12 process, so thank you.

13 With that, so how did we get to this  
14 point? The proposed regulatory changes were made  
15 available to the State Register of Regulations on  
16 August 1st, including information about providing  
17 public comments, which Lisa just did a great job of  
18 explaining which also opened at that point in time.

19 As part of that process to amend  
20 regulations, the Department is conducting tonight's  
21 public hearing on our proposed revisions. And as Lisa  
22 stated, after tonight, the public comment period for  
23 written comments will remain open until the close of  
24 business on September 12th, so 15 days.

1                   So within the Delaware Administrative  
2 Code related to the wildlife regulations, there are 24  
3 sections within our regulations. Tonight we're  
4 proposing to make changes to eight of those sections.

5                   One thing that I would like to clarify,  
6 because we received a lot of comment and feedback  
7 ahead of this hearing, we are not proposing, as part  
8 of this package, to make any changes related to the  
9 minimum age in which hunters can hunt alone or to  
10 hunting license fees. This was in response to House  
11 Bill 451.

12                   A lot of the feedback that we received,  
13 which was passed by the General Assembly in 2022, and  
14 had a three-year grace period for which these are now  
15 going into effect, these aren't any changes that the  
16 Department can initiate. It's something that only the  
17 General Assembly, and with concurrence, the governor  
18 would be able to do, so I just wanted to state that  
19 that's going on because we have received a lot of  
20 feedback prior to this hearing for that.

21                   So what I'd like to do now is talk  
22 about the changes that we are considering as part of  
23 this process. What I don't want to get into this  
24 evening -- and I -- we would spend a lot of time --

1 was the administrative code drafting and style manual  
2 was recently updated, and as such, there are a lot of  
3 formatting, grammar, style changes that are being made  
4 to our regulations.

5 None of these provided any substantive  
6 changes to the intent of any of those regs, so I'm not  
7 going to go through. We're putting a comma here,  
8 we're changing the number 2 to the -- like all of that  
9 stuff. So just note, if you look at the regs, you're  
10 going to see a lot of those kind of things.

11 The first change that we're proposing  
12 is within Section 2. Like I said, we have 24 sections  
13 within our administrative code. This was in  
14 response -- so a need to clarify the seasons for which  
15 muzzle loaders may be used to harvest deer. We needed  
16 to be a little more clarifying with those. There was  
17 some ambiguity.

18 The second change is in 3.0, which is  
19 our federal laws and regulations adopted. We are  
20 proposing to allow hunters under the age of 16 to  
21 participate during the special youth hunts for  
22 waterfowl and migratory game birds. Currently,  
23 participation in these hunts is allowed two hunters  
24 between the ages of 10 and 15, so our proposed change

1 would be to make it 16 and under.

2 Another change is within 4.0, which is  
3 our season sections. Several years ago, the General  
4 Assembly amended laws that were related to  
5 restrictions of Sunday hunting for game birds. We had  
6 some game bird seasons. You'll see another one here  
7 shortly, I think -- actually related to turkeys.

8 But the seasons were prescriptive in  
9 our regulations about when they would occur. And for  
10 the case of crows, the regulations were that the  
11 season was open on Thursdays -- or Fridays, Saturdays,  
12 and Mondays. What we'd like to do now is have it be  
13 Friday, Saturdays, and Sundays to capture that Sunday  
14 that's there, so they're allowed to be open for three  
15 consecutive days.

16 Also, within 4.0 is a requirement to  
17 report the harvest of a gray fox. We are proposing to  
18 remove that mandatory reporting where individuals  
19 would have to call in and speak to the Department if  
20 they harvested one. We would now collect our harvest  
21 information via other means.

22 And as I alluded to about a change  
23 related to Sunday hunting, with the change of that, at  
24 the General Assembly level, we want to clarify that

1 the turkey season will now end on -- on Sunday, sorry,  
2 instead of Saturday, is when it was defined in the --  
3 our administrative code.

4 We also need to remove or are proposing  
5 to remove erroneous text now that turkey harvest  
6 reporting is completed electronically. There's some  
7 existing text in our regulations that refer back to  
8 when there was check stations and hunters had to visit  
9 those, so this is more of a cleanup and clarifying set  
10 of changes here.

11 Similar to our special hunts for youth  
12 hunters for waterfowl, we are proposing to amend the  
13 age for participation in those for all hunters under  
14 the age of 16 rather than have it be limited to those  
15 between the ages of 10 and 15 years of age.

16 Similar to what I just said, we would  
17 like to do the same thing for our special deer hunts  
18 for youth hunters. We would like to allow hunters  
19 under the age of 16 to be able to participate in those  
20 rather than to limiting it between 10 and 15.

21 Section 8 is our part of the code or  
22 regs where we talk about what's allowed and not  
23 allowed on our lands, on our wildlife areas, and  
24 waters that we manage. We are proposing to allow

1 motorized electric carts, wagons, or wheelbarrows to  
2 transport hunting and fishing equipment or game or  
3 fish on lands administered by the division provided  
4 they are not ridden or used to transport any person.

5 Anyone using such equipment must walk  
6 behind while using them or they could walk in front if  
7 they're going to pull it, but they can't be physically  
8 riding it. This is a request to help move and  
9 transport harvested game, but also equipment around.

10 20.0 is our game bird releases section.  
11 When we modified regulations back in 2024, we made a  
12 typographic mistake. There are two types of permits  
13 that people may need depending on the number of game  
14 birds they're releasing.

15 Both of the permits -- 25 birds is the  
16 tipping point between it, but both permits, you -- if  
17 you were 25, you could go to one permit or the other.  
18 We're clarifying which permit people would need for  
19 that, so this is fixing the typo from before.

20 23.0 is our regulations related to  
21 non-native and invasive wildlife. We are proposing to  
22 extend the hunting season for coyotes, and similar to  
23 gray fox, remove the requirement to report the harvest  
24 of such animals. Again, we would use some alternative

1 techniques to estimate and monitor our coyote harvest  
2 similar to other species that we have.

3 And, Lisa, for the sake of the public  
4 record, these are the exhibits that we've put forth on  
5 our public hearing page as of 5 p.m. this evening  
6 before the hearing started, and there have not been  
7 any changes since then, for the record. So if anyone  
8 were to go to the hearing website, this is what they  
9 would see there now.

10 (DNREC Exhibit 1 through Exhibit 7 were  
11 marked for identification.)

12 And as stated before, the written  
13 comment period will remain open until the 12th of  
14 September. And that concludes my portion of the  
15 presentation. And if anyone would like to provide  
16 public comment that's registered, I turn the floor  
17 over to you.

18 MS. VEST: Okay. Thank you so much,  
19 Joe. Just following up on what you just said, I  
20 believe your slide showed seven exhibits, and you said  
21 that they have not been changed or altered since their  
22 posting and they are the same that are up on that  
23 hearing page, so thank you for that confirmation.  
24 We're going to go ahead and let the record -- virtual

1 connectivity interruption --

2 Can you hear me now?

3 THE REPORTER: I can. Sorry.

4 MS. VEST: I don't know what happened  
5 there.

6 Thank you for that confirmation.

7 Just to make sure that I wasn't muted  
8 during all of that --

9 THE REPORTER: Sure.

10 MS. VEST: It's been one of those days.  
11 I apologize.

12 Thank you for the confirmation about  
13 DNREC's proposed exhibits. Let the record reflect  
14 that Exhibits 1 through 7 as identified just now in  
15 the Department's presentation are the same as posted  
16 on the hearing webpage, that they have not been  
17 altered or changed in any way since their posting, and  
18 they are hereby marked as formal DNREC Exhibits 1  
19 through 7 and are now formally incorporated into the  
20 hearing record.

21 Joe, does the Division of Fish and  
22 Wildlife have anything further that they'd wish to add  
23 at this time?

24 MR. ROGERSON: We do not.

1 MS. VEST: Okay. Excellent. That  
2 being said, I was looking at the list of attendees.  
3 As I mentioned in the introductory remarks, we only  
4 have two members of the public that have signed up to  
5 offer comment this evening, and unless one of them is  
6 just joining now, I'm not sure that they're with us  
7 tonight, but I will go ahead and ask. Ryan Maloney  
8 had pre-registered.

9 Mr. Maloney, are you here? I do not  
10 see your name listed as an attendee. If you are here,  
11 will you raise your hand? There's a -- I know we're  
12 virtual, but there's -- on the bottom bar, there's a  
13 little hand icon, and if you hit that, I'll know that  
14 you're here.

15 Again, I do not see Mr. Maloney, but I  
16 wanted -- oh. There is a raised hand. Okay.

17 MR. BIRMINGHAM: U-P-A-R-M in --

18 MS. VEST: -- okay.

19 MR. BIRMINGHAM: There you go. Jay  
20 Birmingham, Middletown, Delaware. Just asking while I  
21 have some of your attention if we could consider  
22 straight wall pistol ammo for coyote as you consider  
23 changing some of the other coyote regulations. But if  
24 you consider giving us straight wall pistol ammo for

1 using for the coyote, I'd like to have that under  
2 consideration. Thank you.

3 MS. VEST: Thank you, sir. I am once  
4 again looking at UPARM [ph] with a raised hand. Can  
5 you unmute yourself?

6 MR. BIRMINGHAM: Yeah. That was me.

7 MS. VEST: Oh. That was you. Okay.

8 MR. BIRMINGHAM: Yes. Yes, ma'am.  
9 Thank you.

10 MS. VEST: Sorry. Sorry about that. I  
11 got you. I got you.

12 Okay. We have another user that just  
13 joined. Let's see if that person is the person I'm  
14 looking for. We have two gentlemen that  
15 pre-registered: one was Ryan Maloney, one was Jeremy  
16 Tucker.

17 Mr. Maloney, are you here tonight? If  
18 so, could you raise your hand? There's a little icon  
19 at the bottom. I just want to make sure that if you  
20 are here, perhaps you're either not using your own  
21 computer and it might have registered you as somebody  
22 else.

23 If Mr. Maloney is not here, is  
24 Mr. Tucker here?

1                   Okay. I do not see either of those  
2 gentlemen, which is fine. It's one of the benefits of  
3 DNREC not closing the record at the conclusion of our  
4 hearings, so I'm going to go ahead. I've got one eye  
5 on the screen and another eye on my paperwork.

6                   Since it appears that neither one of  
7 the gentlemen that pre-registered are attending, I'm  
8 going to go ahead and begin my closing remarks.  
9 Again, as we've mentioned previously, the record is  
10 remaining open through September 12th, which is an  
11 additional 15 days.

12                  Delaware code permits us the ability to  
13 do that and, in fact, insists that we do that, so  
14 whether the comment comes in live this evening or  
15 whether it comes in on the afternoon of September  
16 12th, on the last day, all comments received bear the  
17 same weight and all will be considered by the  
18 Department prior to any decision being formally  
19 entered in this regulatory matter.

20                  As we are closing, because I do not see  
21 either one of those gentlemen online, again, I want to  
22 thank everyone who took the time to join us this  
23 evening and offer the comment. As mentioned  
24 previously, everything that was said tonight is being

1 captured with the court reporter, and as soon as we  
2 get that transcript from Veritext, we will post that  
3 on the hearing page as well.

4 As I close, I want to remind people how  
5 they can offer comment. As noted previously, comments  
6 should be submitted directly to me at DNREC. You can  
7 go on the hearing page and you'll see a little button  
8 that says "Submit a Comment." That will throw it  
9 right to my inbox, and it's secure. You can assure  
10 yourself it will get straight to me.

11 You can send it standard email to  
12 dnrechearingcomments@delaware.gov or the old-fashioned  
13 way through the United States Postal Service. Just  
14 make it attention to me, Lisa Vest, at our address at  
15 89 Kings Highway, Dover, Delaware 19901.

16 I should note for the record that  
17 comments may not be submitted utilizing any kind of  
18 basic social media platforms, so in other words, you  
19 can't tweet a comment. You can't use X, Facebook,  
20 YouTube, Threads, or any kind of standardized text  
21 messaging to somebody. It must be a formal written  
22 comment.

23 And, again, lastly, all comment,  
24 regardless of when or how it comes in, as long as it

1 pertains to the actual proposed regulation amendments  
2 that were discussed this evening, they will be  
3 considered as part of the record and given to the  
4 secretary for his consideration prior to a decision  
5 being made in this matter.

6 I want to thank everybody for their  
7 time and patience while I was struggling to try to  
8 find people to speak tonight. Have a fantastic  
9 evening, have a safe Labor Day weekend, and this  
10 matter is formally adjourned.
