## Regulations regarding EV's and traditionally powered vehicles

I have just been made aware of DENREC plans to adopt California transition strategies against Delaware citizens, businesses, farmers and economy. This transition is being implemented without Public Representation through the legislative process but through unaccountable regulators dictating mandates against Delawareans.

Delawareans support an inclusive approach to energy sources in this state. However the Public is NOT willing to accept the tyrannical strategies of forcing use of electric vehicles and excessive punitive policies against use of traditional fuel sources.

Though manufacturers are earnestly working on building low emissions vehicles, clearly the economy, infrastructure and supply chain cannot sustain success under the proposed regulations being forced on Delaware. Range limitations, excessive time and power required for charging batteries MADE IN CHINA USING FOSSIL MATERIALS, inefficiency and absence of backup of electric vehicles for transport, production of goods and services are only a few of the reasons an accelerated transition cannot be implemented.
