

Develop Household Emergency Plan/Kit

Overview

- Developing a household emergency plan with an emergency kit will help homeowners and renters better prepare for emergency situations including flooding.
- Having a household emergency plan and emergency kit may also help the resident save money on flood associated costs and may increase household resiliency to flood damage.
- Before creating an emergency plan, assess what threats are likely to affect your family and property (e.g. coastal flooding, hurricanes, wind, public health crises, etc.).
- Create your emergency plan with these potential threats in mind.
- o Things to include in the emergency plan:
 - Evacuation plan
 - Flooding adaptation strategy implementation plan
 - Signing up for Delaware Emergency Notification System (DENS)
 - Safety procedures
 - o Family communication plan
 - Emergency information and contacts
- Things to include in the emergency kit:
 - Emergency supplies: Flashlights, batteries, radios, First-Aid kit, medications, 3-day supply of nonperishable food, matches/lighter, one gallon of water per person per day, pet and baby care supplies, cash, blankets and towels, etc.
 - Evacuation kit: One gallon water per day per person, medications, 3-day supply of nonperishable food, health insurance card, cash, First-Aid kit, flashlights, portable radio, batteries, etc.
- Practice implementing the household emergency plan at least once per year.




Key Takeaways

During flood events and other disasters, the health, safety, and welfare of Delawareans may be at risk.

When residents receive warning of emergency conditions, it is important that they are ready to respond quickly to better ensure their comfort, cost savings, and even survival.

In order to better prepare for emergency conditions such as flooding, develop a Household Emergency Plan and Kit for your family.

Expected Maintenance

- Update any changing information on the emergency contact list.
- Check that nonperishable foods in the kit have not expired once per year.
- Check that the portable radios and other technological devices are functioning properly once per year.
