

DNREC's **Weatherization Assistance Program** is a free service that helps qualifying homeowners and renters cut their energy bills by weatherproofing and improving the energy efficiency of their homes. <u>de.gov/wap</u>

DNREC's **Low- to Moderate-Income Solar Program** brings renewable energy to a segment of the Delaware population that has historically been underserved by existing state programs and incentives. Qualifying low-income residents can receive a cost-free solar installation of up to 4.0 kW. Qualifying moderate-income residents can receive a solar installation that has 70% paid for by the LMI Solar Program and 30% by the homeowner for a system size up to 6.0 kW.
